**Topic: ATTENDANCE AT INTERNET GOVERNANCE FORUM**

**Senator Minchin asked:**

- a) In relation to the Internet Governance Forum that the Minister attended in Egypt, when did he accept the invitation to attend?
- b) On what date did the Minister register for the event?
- c) What was the purpose of this forum?
- d) Was the Minister involved as an official speaker, panel member or moderator at any of the sessions which were held, as his name does not seem to appear among the many names listed on the programme for the main sessions?
- e) What exactly did the Minister do at this forum, was it just a case of sit and listen?
- f) Was there any scope for him to participate remotely, by teleconference for example?
- g) Did the Minister do any site seeing while in Egypt?
- h) Did the Minister consider cancelling his visit to Egypt given the forum coincided with a crucial parliamentary sitting week?

**Answer:**

- a) A general invitation was extended by Mr Sha Zukang, Under-Secretary-General, Department of Economic and Social Affairs (UNDESA), on behalf of the Secretary-General of the United Nations, inviting participation of all entities, including governments, accredited to the World Summit on the Information Society. The Department registered on behalf of the Minister on 30 October 2009.
- b) Please see answer (a) above.
- c) The IGF is a key outcome of the World Summit on the Information Society, and was established as a multi-stakeholder discussion forum on internet related public policy issues. The IGF is unique in the range of stakeholders and the breadth of issues discussed. These include Governments, civil society, industry, non-government organisations, academia and international organisations.

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At the 2009 meeting, approximately 1800 people participated, including representatives from key industry stakeholders and from major developed and developing countries, including 15 foreign Ministers.

Topics of discussion at the 2009 IGF included:

- the management of critical internet resources;
- the growth potential of broadband;
- online child safety;
- internet openness and privacy;
- e-security and the emergence of modern cyber threats;
- the impact of social networks;
- opportunities to bolster youth internet access and participation; and
- general internet governance issues including the continuation of the IGF beyond 2010.

The 2009 forum was a strategically important opportunity to engage individual countries, the International Telecommunication Union (ITU), and other international organisations that are involved in the management of critical internet resources. The Minister's active participation in the IGF was consistent with the Government's foreign policy priority for engagement in the United Nations.

The Minister's involvement in the forum was a unique occasion to engage with stakeholders that normally do not participate in other fora (such as the Internet Corporation for Assigned Names and Number (ICANN)). High level participation in the IGF sends an important message that Australia is willing to reach out to these stakeholders to build consensus on essential issues relating to internet governance. The Sharm El Sheikh forum was particularly important, as there was frank discussion of the recent decision of the United States Government to significantly alter its governance arrangements with ICANN.

- d) No. Presentations at the IGF do not follow a traditional 'lecture' style. Instead, the IGF provides an opportunity for participants to engage in open, free and frank discussion on particular topics. Generally, facilitators, panel members and presenters at the IGF guide the discussion of the forum.
- e) The Minister attended a number of open forums and workshops held during the Egypt IGF, and actively engaged in policy debate with other IGF participants at these meetings.

The Minister's participation provided a strategic opportunity to promote Australia's re-election to the ITU Council ahead of the plenipotentiary meeting later this year, as well as the opportunity to promote Australia's ground breaking work on cyber safety initiatives, approaches to online security and Australia's policy views on internet governance. Re-election to the ITU council is fundamental in influencing treaty processes that govern the use of the global radiofrequency spectrum and use of communications technologies. This in turn supports Australia's investment in telecommunications, satellite and broadcasting services, including Government investments in defence and scientific industries. A role in the ITU Council is also vital in supporting our long standing alliances with other nations.

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As noted in answer (c), the Minister participated in discussion of a wide range of topics relevant to the portfolio including issues relating to internet governance, the emergence of modern cyber-threats and online child protection and safety.

In addition to participating in the main forum activities, the Minister held bilateral discussions on a range of issues related to the portfolio, including with:

- Ms Viviane Reding, EU Commissioner for Information Society and Media - Discussed Europe's position on the IGF, the European Commission's telecommunications regulatory reform and the National Broadband Network;
  - Mr Rod Beckstrom, CEO of ICANN - Discussed the evolution of ICANN (including the role of Governments), new generic Top Level Domains, strategies on Internet Protocol version 6 (IPv6) and the Affirmation of Commitments signed between the United States Government and ICANN;
  - Ms Lyn St.Amour, President/CEO of the Internet Society - Discussed internet governance arrangements, including the evolution of ICANN and the continuation of the IGF;
  - Mr Alum Michaels, UK Member of Parliament- Discussed online cyber bullying and child protection guidelines, the continuation of the IGF, Commonwealth of Nations IGF and the re-election of Australia to the ITU council;
  - Dr Tarek Kamel, Egyptian Minister of Communications and Information Technology- Discussed the future of the IGF and strategies to promote Australia as the host for future major international sporting events; and
  - Mr Ferry de Kerckhove, Canadian Ambassador to Egypt- Discussed the continuation of the IGF.
- f) No. The IGF offered limited remote participation services, and combined with the time difference, made effective remote participation impossible. Bilateral meetings with key Ministers and officials would have been impractical.
- g) No.
- h) Due to the significance and weight of this IGF meeting, it was important that Australia was represented at the most senior level possible, to influence future direction of the debate on internet governance.

**Topic: CONSULTANCY COSTS**

**Senator Minchin asked:**

The graph on page 102 of the annual report (Fig 3.1) shows a dramatic spike in consultancy costs in the 2008/09 financial year. Total spending was around the \$18 million mark, in 2007/08 the figure was around \$11 million and in 2006/07 it was below \$10 million.

- a) Is the dramatic spike in expenditure on consultancies expected to continue in this current financial year?
- b) Is the Department becoming increasingly reliant on external consultants?
- c) Please provide a current figure on total spending on both consultants, external legal advice, including NBN Expert panel costs in relation to both the NBN Mark I and NBN Mark II proposal?
- d) How much has been spent to date on the NBN Implementation Study?
- e) What was exact amount of the contract for the Implementation Study which has been entered into with McKinsey/KPMG?
- f) Is there scope for this contract to be revised?
- g) Can you confirm whether or not incidental expenditure incurred by members of the McKinsey/KPMG Implementation Study team (travel, accommodation, meals) are included in the contract or are these paid separately?
- h) If paid separately by the Department, could you provide a breakdown of costs incurred for travel, accommodation and meals; including details of the accommodation ie where people stayed, cost per meal, modes of transport, including class of travel?

**Answer:**

- a) Expenditure is expected to continue in this current financial year as a result of the continuing NBN related consultancy agreement.

- c) The total spending on both consultants and external legal advice, including NBN Expert panel costs in relation to NBN Mark I is \$11,825,201. Consultancy/contractors and external legal advice expenses to 28 February 2010 for the NBN Mark II, total \$25,443,154 (excluding GST)
- d) .Consultancy and legal expenses for the Implementation Study to 28 February 2010 total \$22,211,052 (excluding GST).
- e) The contracted amount for McKinsey / KPMG is \$22,799,700 (GST exclusive).
- f) In alignment with the Department's standard form agreement there is a clause that allows for a variation to the contract.
- g) Travel, accommodation and associated expenses are not reimbursed under the agreement.

**Topic: Employee Performance Bonuses**

**Senator Minchin asked:**

On page 124 of the Annual Report Table 4.8, it shows that a total of 159 employees received performance payments totalling \$1.22 million and that 7 employees received payments totalling \$31, 874 this financial year for the 2007/08 financial year (Table 4.9) The highest individual payment was \$27, 617.

- a) Could you please explain the basis for which performance payments are made and how the individual amounts are calculated?
- b) Could you provide a breakdown of performance payments made over the last three financial years?
- c) When are the performance payments typically paid?

**Answer:**

a) Senior Executive Service (SES) level staff in the Department have access to Performance Based Pay via a Section 24/1 Determination.

Executive Level staff have access to Performance Based Pay if they agree to a Common Law Contract.

Currently, two staff at the APS6 classification access Performance Based Pay.

The Department specifies a five-point performance rating scale, as follows:

<b>Rating scale</b>
Unsatisfactory (1)
Needs Development (2)
Fully Effective (3)
Very good (4)
Outstanding (5)

The entitlement to, and payment of, a performance bonus is determined by the employees' end-cycle performance assessment rating. Payments are linked to the employees' annual base salary.

The performance bonus scale and attendant performance bonus payments follow:

**Senator Fisher asked:**

- a) What is the total expenditure on staffing for the Department and for all portfolio agencies? What is the SES & non-SES breakdown?
- b) What are the current staffing levels for SES and non-SES officers? What is the breakdown by location?
- c) What have been the changes in average staffing levels since November 2007? Why have these changes occurred? What have been the Budgetary implications?
- d) In the case of reductions in staff numbers, how have these reductions been absorbed by the Department? What functions have been sacrificed and why?
- e) Has there been a target for staff reductions to achieve savings? What is this target and what strategy is being implemented to achieve this?
- f) Have any voluntary or involuntary redundancies been offered to staff? If so, how have staff been identified for such offers? Are there such plans for the future?

**Answer:**

- a) Total expenses on employee benefits for the Department for the period 1 July 2009 to 31 January 2010 is \$40.1m. Total expenses on employee benefits for the Department for the period 1 July 2009 to 31 January 2010 is \$40.1m, including \$3.7m for substantive SES staff. The Department has not included data relating to portfolio agencies as those agencies have responded to the same questions posed to them directly.
- b) The breakdown (FTE) by location is:

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The figures above include one SES staff member who was absent on paid Maternity Leave and one staff member on temporary assignment of duties temporarily filling her position.

- c) Over the period 30 November 2007 and 31 January 2010, the Department's staffing has fallen from 874.4 full time equivalent (FTE) employees to 647.9 FTE employees. This movement reflects the impact of the December 2007 Machinery of Government changes to the former Department of Communications, Information Technology and the Arts and also reflects the impact of government decisions over the period.
- d) Since December 2007 the Department has had no further reduction in staff numbers since the Government came to office.
- e) The Department does not have a target for staff reductions to achieve savings.
- f) Since Additional Estimates in October 2009, there have been no voluntary or involuntary redundancies offered to staff. The Department has no plans to initiate a further round of voluntary retrenchments.

**Answer:**

The following figures are based on **headcount** for the Department.

- a) A total of 45 ongoing (permanent) staff have been employed since the supplementary budget estimates.
- b) The breakdown of staff level of ongoing staff employed since the supplementary budget estimates appears in the table below:

**Senator Fisher asked:**

- a) What is the status of each election commitment within the portfolio?
- b) Which election commitments are experiencing slippages? Why? Where relevant, what are the revised implementation dates? What are the implications of this slippage?

**Answer:**

a) There were 10 election commitments relating to broadband, communications and the digital economy portfolio:

1. Cyber Safety. (significantly progressed)
2. National Broadband Network. (significantly progressed)
3. Digital Television. (significantly progressed)
4. Abolition of Digital Australia. (implemented)
5. Ensure adequate funding of ABC and SBS. (implemented)
6. Establish a new ABC Board selection process for appointment of board members. (implemented)
7. "Do not call" register funding. (implemented)
8. Improve TV reception in Broadford (Vic), King Island (Tas) and the Makin-Wakefield (SA) area of outer metropolitan Adelaide. (significantly progressed)
9. Cultural diplomacy: rebuild of Radio Australia. (significantly progressed)
10. Amend the ABC charter to mandate minimum levels of Australia drama. (The Government provided \$185.3 million in the 2009-10 budget to enable the ABC and SBS to produce more Australian programs, news, and local information. The additional funding will significantly boost the ABC's capacity to support Australian drama and gives effect to the intent of the commitment to amend the Charter.

Amending the Charter of the ABC to require local content production is a matter which the Government will address at an appropriate time).

**Answer:**

- a) No. The Department has not been requested to do so. There is a requirement for agencies to publish details of all grants on their website within seven days of the signing of the grant agreement which includes grant funding location.
- b) The Department prepares locality issues briefs on a broad range of departmental programs for the Minister's attendance at Community Cabinet meetings and other regional visits. It also contributes to a locality brief prepared by the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet for each Community Cabinet Meeting.
- c) Electoral specific data is not part of the assessment criteria of any grants program administered by the department.

**Senator Fisher asked:**

- a) How much has the Department spent on consultancy services since November 2007? How can the department justify this expenditure?
- b) Could the Department provide a complete list of current consultancy services? For each consultancy, please indicate the rationale for the project and its intended use. For each consultancy, please indicate why the Department or its agencies could not have undertaken the work themselves.

**Answer:**

All agencies subject to the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997* are required to report procurement contracts awarded where the contract value is \$10 000 or more on AusTender, the government's tender and procurement reporting system. From 3 September 2007 departments and agencies have been required to include on AusTender details of those contracts which are consultancies, and the justification for each consultancy. The information sought in relation to DBCDE consultancies valued at \$10 000 or more, are available on the AusTender website ([www.tenders.gov.au](http://www.tenders.gov.au)). Please note that departments have six weeks to report procurement contracts on AusTender.

Further details on consultancy expenditure is available in the Department's annual report.

While AusTender and the Annual Report contain details of contracts valued at \$10 000 or more, it is considered to be an unreasonable diversion of resources for the Department to provide details of consultancies valued at less than \$10 000.

**Answer:**

All agencies subject to the *Financial Management and Accountability Act 1997* are required to report procurement contracts awarded where the contract value is \$10 000 or more on AusTender, the government's tender and procurement reporting system. The information sought in relation to DBCDE advertising and marketing contracts valued at \$10 000 or more, are available on the AusTender website ([www.tenders.gov.au](http://www.tenders.gov.au)). Please note that departments have six weeks to report procurement contracts on AusTender.

Further details on expenditure are available in the Department's annual report.

While AusTender contains details of contracts valued at \$10 000 or more and the Annual Report contains details of contracts at \$10 900 or more, it is considered to be an unreasonable diversion of resources for the Department to provide details of advertising and marketing contracts below these values.

**i) Digital Switchover Campaign 2009-10**

The Department is undertaking a Digital Switchover Campaign which will inform the Australian public about what they need to do to switch, when their region will be switching and why we are switching from analog to digital television.

**ii) National Cyber Security Awareness Week 2010**

National Cyber Security Awareness Week (formerly National E-security Awareness Week) is an annual initiative held in partnership with industry, community and consumer groups and state and territory governments. The week aims to help Australians understand cyber security risks and educate home and small business users on the simple steps they can take to protect their personal and financial information.

**iii) Satellite Phone Subsidy**

The Satellite Phone Subsidy is an Australian Government initiative to help people living or working outside of terrestrial mobile phone coverage to purchase satellite mobile phones.

b)

**i) Digital Switchover Campaign**—The spend on Digital Switchover communication in 08-09 was \$7.1 million. The amount budgeted in 2009-10 is \$23.1 million; in 2010-11 is \$22.4 million; and 2011-12 is \$13.4 million. Total allocated budget for Digital Switchover communication from 08-09 until December 2011 is \$66 million.

**ii) Cyber Security Awareness week**—The planned spend on the Awareness Week is \$252,483 in 2009 – 10.

**iii) Satellite Phone Subsidy Scheme**—The planned spend on the Satellite Phone Subsidy is \$200,000 in 2009 – 10.
