- 1. What action is taken to check the background of the businesses and the individuals to whom grants are paid under the Department's programs?
- 2. Are there ASIC checks performed on the businesses and/or each of the applicants and/or each of the project proponents, for instance?

## **ANSWER**

- 1. As part of the assessment process of applications for financial assistance (ie, grants), the Department of Innovation, Industry, Science and Research undertakes a range of background checks. These can include:
  - searching mercantile databases, such as ASIC and ABR, to establish:
    - whether the business exists:
    - if adverse notices about the applicant have been issued; and
    - the degree of relationship (if any) between the applicant, nominated referees, proposed suppliers and contractors associated with the project;
  - reviewing the applicant's financial records;
  - assessing the applicant's capability to achieve their proposed deliverables for the project;
  - contacting the referees nominated in the application;
  - checking an applicant's previous history with the Department;
  - internet searches of information about the applicant in the public domain;
  - reviewing the applicant's website to corroborate certain facts about the business; and
  - on occasion, visiting the applicant at their premises.
