The CLO also provides all briefing for Cabinet and Sub-Cabinet Committee meetings to the Ministers office.

^{*} The Hon Martin Ferguson AM MP established the Investor Reference Group (IRG) in February 2011, a group of leading representatives from the electricity sector, to advise on energy sector investments and to assist with the development of the independent review of investment issues relating to the electricity generation sector. Deloitte was appointed as the consultant for this work.

The non-Commonwealth members of the IRG worked together to prepare a report expressing their views on the impact of carbon policy uncertainty on investments in the Australian energy industry, in particular on the electricity generation sector. Members were also guided by a Terms of Reference (ToR). The ToR for the IRG and its membership are at **Attachment D**.

The report was prepared at no cost to the Commonwealth. One RET official was involved in managing the progress of the report but was not involved in drafting. The Minister released the IRG's Report on 18 May 2011.

Tourism Reports

The Department has commissioned a number of research reports under the auspices of the Tourism Ministers' Council (TMC). These are not reports that have been 'commissioned by the Government' as such; these reports have been commissioned on behalf of the National Long-Term Tourism Strategy Working Groups to progress the work program agreed by the TMC.

In addition, the Department engaged Deloitte Access Economics (contract signed 19 May 2011) to undertake a scoping study to investigate the viability of medical tourism in Australia. The scoping study is structured with two discrete stages:

- <u>Stage 1</u> will investigate the potential demand for Australia as a medical tourism destination; and the capacity of Australia's medical tourism supply chain to cater for this demand; and
- <u>Stage 2</u> will estimate the potential economic benefits of medical tourism in Australia; identify government initiatives to support the growth of medical tourism; identify all risks from growth in medical tourism; qualify the impact of the risks; provide options for government to manage risks; and complete a cost benefit analysis.

The final Stage 1 report is due to be completed by 19 October 2011 and will cost \$57,173. The decision to pursue Stage 2 will be at the Department's discretion (subject to the findings of Stage 1 and funding availability).

The scoping study does not represent a commitment by the Australian Government to pursue medical tourism.

INDEPENDENT REVIEW OF INVESTMENT ACTIVITY IN THE AUSTRALIAN ELECTRICITY GENERATION SECTOR – TERMS OF REFERENCE

The Department of Resources, Energy and Tourism (RET) has commissioned a consultant (Deloitte) to conduct an independent review of investment activity in the Australian electricity generation sector in the context of continuing uncertainty around the introduction of a carbon price, and the impacts that this could have on energy security.

The objective of this study is to examine whether an ongoing delay or uncertainty around the introduction of a carbon price is causing delay or economically sub-optimal outcomes in investment in electricity generating plant needed to meet anticipated demand.

The consultant will address the above objectives by specifically examining:

- i. Historical trends in electricity investment including generation and technology type, fuel type, and capacity to meet demand to date; and whether a 'shadow carbon price' is in operation.
- ii. The influence mandatory Government energy policies, such as the 20 per cent Renewable Energy Target, and changing load profiles in the market are having on investment choice.
- iii. Electricity sector scenarios that compare investments made assuming (i) investor uncertainty over the introduction of a carbon price, (ii) a shadow carbon price and (iii) a real carbon price in place holding other policy settings constant. The scenarios should:
 - a. Draw out differences between scenario assumptions for technology, fuel and capacity choices by location;
 - b. Show the cost implications and differences for future electricity prices between the scenarios; and
 - c. Ability of predicted investment to meet forecast demand under different scenarios.

INDEPENDENT REVIEW OF INVESTMENT ACTIVITY IN THE AUSTRALIAN ELECTRICITY GENERATION SECTOR – INVESTMENT REFERENCE GROUP

The Minister for Resources and Energy has appointed an Investment Reference Group (IRG) to advise on energy sector investments and to assist with the development of an independent review of investment issues relating to the electricity generation sector.

This independent review will assess investment activity in the Australian electricity generation sector in the context of continuing uncertainty around the introduction of a carbon price, and the impacts that this could have on energy security, reliability and electricity prices.

The IRG is chaired by the Secretary of the Department of Resources, Energy and Tourism and includes investors and operators of electricity generation assets, energy market bodies, project financiers and state government participants.

The IRG will report to the Minister for Resources and Energy in coming months.

Deloitte has been appointed as the consultant for the independent review.

The Terms of Reference for the Independent Review are listed at Appendix A.
