General Notes:

Data in this table has been primarily sourced from DSS/FaCS Annual Reports. Where there have been revisions to Annual Report data these have been sourced from administrative data. For example, Newstart Allowance figures for 1997-98 – 1999-00 are different from FaCS Annual Report figures as they reflect the revised methodology for counting recipient numbers introduced by FaCS in July 2002. Data for 2000-01 to 2003-04 uses a consistent definition, that is, excluding zero paid recipients and Community Development Employment Projects (CDEP) participants. Original figures for recipient numbers updated in subsequent year's Annual Report are denoted by (*). Data is for June each year except Parenting Payment, Parenting Payment (partnered), Parenting Payment (single) which is based on point in time April to June quarter data for each financial year. Prior to March 1998, Parenting Payment (single) and Parenting Payment (partnered) were known respectively as Sole Parent Pension and Parenting Allowance.

- Figures in this column list Youth Allowance (other) data only. Youth Allowance (YA) includes YA (other), administered by the Department of Employment and Workplace Relations (DEWR) and YA (full-time students) administered by the Department of Education Science and Technology (DEST) since October 2004. YA was introduced on 1 July 1998. YA amalgamated five payments administered by the Department of Social Security (Youth Training Allowance, More than the Minimum Family Payment, Newstart Allowance and Sickness Allowance for 16 to 20-year-olds) and DEWR (AUSTUDY) for students aged 16 to 24). It replaced AUSTUDY for 16-24-year-olds and NSA, Youth Training Allowance and Sickness Allowance for under 21-year-olds. It also replaced Family Payment for 16 to 18-year-old secondary students.

This decrease was the result of new rules implemented on 20 March 1996 which restricted qualification for SA to: (a) people who have a job to return to; or (b) former students who have lost their AUSTUDY or ABSTUDY payment as a result of their illness or injury and who intend to resume their study. The decrease in Sickness Allowance numbers was offset by an increase in the number of people receiving Newstart Allowance or Youth Training Allowance who are exempted from satisfying the activity test because of a temporary incapacity for work.
