## **Priority Employment Areas**

Regarding Priority Employment Areas- how many jobs were created in these areas? What was the unemployment rate in each of these priority areas, in February 2008? What is the unemployment rate in each of these priority areas now? What is the youth unemployment rate in each of these areas (15-24 years old)?

## **Answer**

The identification of the 20 priority employment areas was based on an in-depth analysis of around 70 labour market indicators, a combination of which highlights a region's likelihood of experiencing labour market disadvantage now or in the future. As part of the process used to identify priority employment areas, particular weight was given to a range of characteristics and/or criteria, including: a high unemployment rate; a pick-up in unemployment beneficiaries since the global financial crisis; the proportion of the population on income support; low levels of educational attainment; and a region's industry structure. These indicators are strong determinants of current and future labour market performance.

Population size and reasonable travelling distances for Local Employment Coordinators was also taken into account in identifying Priority Employment Areas. Local intelligence, where available, was also used to supplement the wide range of statistical data.

It is also important to note that there is a strong correlation between priority employment areas and the disadvantaged suburbs identified by the Australian Social Inclusion Board.

Table 1, below, provides information on the unemployment rate, the youth unemployment rate and the level of employment for each Priority Employment Area for February 2008 and February 2012 (latest available data).
