Question

NAPLAN withdrawal rates in Victorian schools

An article, "Stressed kids miss tests: NAPLAN boycotts" by Jessica Marszalek, appeared on page 10 of the Herald Sun on Saturday 24 November 2012. Citing research and analysis by economist Trevor Cobbold, the article indicated that, in relation to 2012 NAPLAN testing,

- 11 schools in Victoria had student withdrawal rates over 75%,
- 4 Victorian schools had withdrawal rates of 50-75% and
- 11 Victorian schools had 25-50% withdrawal rates.
- a) Please provide the following information for each of the schools included in the above statistics (26 schools total) in tabular form:
 - i. Name of school
 - ii. Number of students who withdrew from testing
 - iii. Percentage of students who withdrew from testing
 - iv. Any reasons provided by the school for withdrawals

Answer

The Australian Curriculum, Assessment & Reporting Authority has provided the following response:

Withdrawals are initiated at the parent/carer's request, and there is no requirement for a reason to be provided. Test Administration Authorities in states and territories each have their own process for managing withdrawals. ACARA does not request or receive qualitative information on this process.

The article by Mr Trevor Cobbold, available at www.saveourschools.com.au/league-tables/many-schools-have-high-withdrawal-rates-from-naplan, which draws on 2011 data from the *My School* website, is understood to be the basis for claims about numbers of schools in the media article.

ACARA has undertaken an analysis of the 2011 withdrawal data published on *My School* based on participation in the Reading¹ test. Depending on which year level is considered, some schools may be represented more than once within or across the tables below. ACARA's data do not accord with Mr Cobbold's analysis, for which no methodology was available.

¹ Participation rates across domains (Reading, Numeracy, Writing and Language Conventions) are fairly similar.
