The figures provided in response to Parliamentary Question No. 3402 have been updated to include estimated FEE-HELP debt due to the increase from 10% to 25% in the maximum number of fee-paying places which may be offered in a course of study in medicine, and the increase in the general FEE-HELP limit to \$80,000 and to \$100,000 for students in medicine, dentistry and veterinary science courses.

The figures quoted at the hearings were for FEE-HELP loans by calendar year. Total FEE-HELP debt consists of two components: FEE-HELP loans and FEE-HELP loan fees.

The increase in estimated FEE-HELP loans from year to year reflects anticipated growth in student numbers and tuition fee levels, the increase in the FEE-HELP limit as announced in the 2006-07 Budget, and the increase from 10% to 25% in the maximum percentage of domestic undergraduate fee-paying places which may be offered in a course of study in medicine.

FEE-HELP debts are incurred by students in fee-paying places only. Fee-paying places are over and above Commonwealth supported places. Most undergraduate students at public universities study in Commonwealth supported places, to which the Australian Government contributes substantially to the cost.
