#### Question Number: W128-07

#### **Question:**

Senator Wong asked in writing: Please provide statistics on the number of workers employed by motels in regional areas fast-food outlets and cafes and restaurants in regional areas in Australia. Please provide these divided by State and regions.

#### Answer:

The ABS does not produce employment data specifically for motels. However, it does produce quarterly estimates of employment for the broader industry group of accommodation, cafes and restaurants, from the ABS *Labour Force Survey*. These data are provided, by State/Territory and Capital City/Balance of State, in Table 1 below.

The ABS does not produce up-to-date data for the more highly disaggregated sub-industry groups of fast-food retailing or cafes and restaurants. The latest information for these industry categories are from the 2001 Census and are provided in Table 2 below. (The ABS data for fast-food retailing is proxied by the 'Take-away food retailing' industry category.) It should be recognised, however, that labour market conditions have changed significantly since 2001. Accordingly, using the figures in Table 2 to provide an indication of employment in these industry categories in 2006 should be undertaken with a high degree of caution.
