The program commenced on 1 January 2007	31 December 2009	From 1 January 2010, as part of the Australian Government's contribution to the National Partnership on Youth Attainment and Transitions, existing youth, transitions, mentoring and career programs (including Youth Pathways) were consolidated into a new program, Youth Connections. Youth Connections provides an improved safety net for young people who have disengaged from education, or are at risk of disengaging, through the provision of individually tailored case management and support to help young people to re-connect with education or training and build resilience, skills and attributes that promote positive life choices and wellbeing.	The Government provided \$59.5 million over five years (including \$13.6 million in 2010-11) to help approximately 6000 young people a year experiencing mental health problems who are at risk of dropping out of school.	Since 1 January 2007, 8,619 young people who identified as having mental health problems were assisted through Youth Pathways. Youth Pathways programme, and provides one-on-one assistance to identify services and professional support to help individual young people with their specific needs.
