Question:

Answer:

Schools Transitional Emergency Assistance Program

A table setting out funding provided to individual schools in the program years 2000 to 2003, and the reasons for that funding, is provided below.

The STEA Program is available to provide financial assistance to non-government schools in the event of an unexpected circumstance causing severe, temporary financial difficulty. The Program does not cover government schools because they are part of a State system which has responsibility to meet the costs of its schools and, for the same reason, funds would not normally be available to schools which form part of a larger non-government system.

Non-disclosure clauses are included in the STEA contracts between the schools and the Australian Government for both parties. This element is included to protect the school. If it became public knowledge that a school was failing there is a considerable risk that parents would withdraw their children from the school and compound the problem facing the school. This could negate any assistance provided to the school through the STEA Program. In line with these non-disclosure clauses it is the practice of the Government not to release the names of the individual schools assisted through this Program.

Schools applying for assistance must meet certain criteria to be eligible and must also provide and implement a robust Business and Recovery Plan which sets out the way in which the school will address the financial problems it faces. The plan must address the causes of the school's problems and provide a way forward including operational and structural changes, if necessary. The four criteria are

- **transitional**: the school must demonstrate that it has the capacity, with assistance, to resume operating satisfactorily;
- emergency: the school must show that, because of the situation it faces, the financial viability of the school, its curriculum or the welfare of the students is threatened;
- **unexpected**: the circumstance facing the school could not reasonably have been foreseen:
- special need: the school must demonstrate it does not have access to resources to address its financial needs.

In assessing an application for assistance, the Department aims to ascertain the root causes of the problem facing the school and to ensure that these causes are addressed. To this end it will, in many cases, obtain the advice of an independent expert on the financial condition of the school and, in consultation with the school, ensure that the expert's recommendations are addressed in the school's Business and Recovery Plan.

In some cases this has necessitated changes in the governance arrangements for schools.

Grants are made on the basis of a contract and, where recommendations are to be implemented, progress payments are made against clear and unequivocal milestones which the schools must meet.
