Senator Nettle provided the following question in writing on 2 November 2005

## Question:

What are the Minister's estimates for unmet demand for student enrolments in each of the following skill areas for each of the years 1996 to 2004?

- i. Doctors
- ii. Dentists
- iii. Nurses
- iv. Teachers (Primary)
- v. Teachers (Secondary)
- vi. Optometrists

## Answer:

Unmet demand for student enrolments in Universities for particular fields of education

Estimates of unmet demand for undergraduate places in Universities are calculated and published by the Australian Vice-Chancellors' Committee (AVCC). The AVCC releases these estimates around May each year.

The AVCC does not publish estimates of unmet demand by field of education.

However, the AVCC does provide some information on 'eligible applicants not receiving an offer' by field of education. In defining an eligible applicant, the AVCC removes Year 12 applicants with unrealistic expectations of getting into university (those with a TER of below 53). 'Eligible applicants not receiving an offer' are still an over estimate of unmet demand as multiple applications lodged by the same person, applicants with one or two preferences only and rejection of offers are not taken into account. The AVCC takes these additional factors into account when it estimates unmet demand<sup>1</sup>.

The following tables provide information on 'eligible applicants not receiving' an offer for selected fields of education for 1996-2000 and 2001-2005. Specific data on optometrists, teachers (Primary) and teachers (Secondary) are not available.
