Question

PRODUCTIVITY PLACES PROGRAM IN STATES & TERRITORIES

How is the Department monitoring the number of Productivity Places being offered by each State or Territory? Are all States offering Productivity Places? How many were undertaken in each of the States and Territories in the last financial year? (Please provide a breakdown- happy for this to be taken on notice). What were the top 10 courses by commencement? What were the top 10 courses by completion? What percentage of students completed a PPP course?

Answer

a) How is the Department monitoring the number of Productivity Places being offered by each state or territory?

The Department monitors State and Territory delivery of Productivity Places Program training through monthly, six monthly and annual reports submitted by states and territories in accordance with the National Partnership Agreement. The Department publishes an Annual Report for each calendar year.

b) Are all States offering Productivity Places?

All participating states and territories commenced offering training under the National Partnership for Productivity Places Program in 2009. Victoria has negotiated separate arrangements and is not a signatory to the National Partnership. Victoria signed an Intergovernmental Agreement for Additional Training Delivery in Victoria under the Productivity Places Program (also known as Commonwealth Own Purposes Expenditure - COPE) on 23 December 2008. Training through this agreement was also made available in 2009.

c) How many were undertaken in each of the States and Territories in the last financial year?

State and territory training delivery data for 2009-10 is not available. The National Partnership contains training targets by calendar year and audited data of state and territory delivery is reported on that basis.

A breakdown of Productivity Places Program delivery in each of the States and Territories in the 2009 calendar year is provided below.

f) What percentage of students completed a PPP course?

The duration of training delivered through the Productivity Places Program is, on average, expected to take between one and three years depending on the level of qualification undertaken by participants. State and territory delivery under the Productivity Places Program is focused on higher level qualifications where the duration of training is on average three years and in many cases the training programs only began in the second half of 2009. States and territories are progressively submitting data for the 2010 training year which the department is collating. We will be in a position to report on completion rates once the collating of 2010 data is finalised
