Answer

The Department of Veterans' Affairs has implemented a range of savings strategies in relation to travel, external consultants and contractors, online advertising for recruitment and printing costs. Savings in air travel has largely been achieved through changed booking arrangements for flights (eg. reduced use of fully flexible fares) and less usage of business class airfares for flights on the eastern seaboard. Reduced usage and other similar arrangements have been put in place to achieve cost reductions across the other savings categories.

Answer

The total cost of training for the 2013 graduates is estimated at \$140,000.

Eleven graduates have been engaged to participate in the Graduate Development Program delivered by the Australian Public Service Commission (ASPC). In addition, another 2 graduates have been engaged to participate in the 2013 Australian Government ICT Graduate Program. This is a new initiative being coordinated by Australian Government Information Management Office (AGIMO) and the APSC. On successful completion of their respective Program, graduates will receive a Diploma of Government.

In addition to the training involved with the Diploma of Government and on-the-job training, DVA graduates will participate in an internal orientation program and undertake a state location visit to a DVA office. The ICT graduates will also participate in orientation and state location visits.

All further training is determined on an individual needs-basis, through discussion between the graduate and their supervisor. All staff including graduates are required to have a current performance agreement in place. This includes an Individual Development Plan (IDP) which details the development needs and opportunities for the individual. Graduates will have access to a suite of elearning modules and other internal training opportunities if required.

(1) On 1 January 2012, amendments to the Safety, Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 1988 (SRCA) came into effect and the functions and role of the Safety, Rehabilitation and Compensation Commission (SRCC) changed. As a consequence, the MRCC member nominated by the Minister for Employment and Workplace Relations, Mr O'Connor, no longer met the statutory definition allowing his office to be nominated to the MRCC.

[2] The SMRC does not have a fixed number of members: a separate panel or 'review council' is constituted for each review and overall member numbers are determined by the number of reviews being managed by the Council at any one time. Length of appointment varies between three and five years. The Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986 (VEA) sets out the term of office for SMRC members, and, whilst a person may not be appointed to office for a period of more than five years, they are eligible for reappointment after that period.

[3] The appointment date for ACAB members was previously reported (refer Supplementary Budget Estimates 19 October 2011, Question on Notice 5) as 12 October 2011, however this was the date of announcement. The date of appointment was 13 October 2011. The end date for current contracts is 30 June 2012, however commitment is intended to be for the duration of the program until 2018.

[4] State based boards provided a one consolidated list. Note: The Boards previously reported on in October 2011 but not February 2012 as the current Boards were appointed in March 2012 and previous Boards ceased on 31 December 2011.

(1) On 1 January 2012, amendments to the Safety, Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 1988 (SRCA) came into effect and the functions and role of the Safety, Rehabilitation and Compensation Commission (SRCC) changed. As a consequence, the MRCC member nominated by the Minister for Employment and Workplace Relations, Mr O'Connor, no longer met the statutory definition allowing his office to be nominated to the MRCC.

[2] The SMRC does not have a fixed number of members: a separate panel or 'review council' is constituted for each review and overall member numbers are determined by the number of reviews being managed by the Council at any one time. Length of appointment varies between three and five years. The Veterans' Entitlements Act 1986 (VEA) sets out the term of office for SMRC members, and, whilst a person may not be appointed to office for a period of more than five years, they are eligible for reappointment after that period.

[3] The appointment date for ACAB members was previously reported (refer Supplementary Budget Estimates 19 October 2011, Question on Notice 5) as 12 October 2011, however this was the date of announcement. The date of appointment was 13 October 2011. The end date for current contracts is 30 June 2012, however commitment is intended to be for the duration of the program until 2018.

[4] State based boards provided a one consolidated list. Note: The Boards previously reported on in October 2011 but not February 2012 as the current Boards were appointed in March 2012 and previous Boards ceased on 31 December 2011.

<u>'Operation Aborted' error.</u> In March 2012, a Microsoft Security Patch was deployed which introduced an Internet Explorer 'Operation Aborted' error to DVA's ICT environment. The error caused certain websites to shut down abruptly displaying the 'Operation Aborted' error. The ICT team implemented a fix for this problem on Friday 2 November 2012.

<u>'Internet Explorer disappearing</u>'. This issue occurs because Internet Explorer Version 7.0, when used within DVA's ICT environment, does not cope with memory hungry and rich content websites. This results in Internet Explorer shutting down abruptly and without any error message. DVA and the Department of Human Services (DHS) are working together to resolve this internet problem through modernisation of the DVA ICT environment.

These issues had minor impact on the Minister's Office. These issues have not impacted availability of the Department's websites to clients.

No other specific internet outages occurred.

<u>Answer</u>

Accidental use of cards for personal purchases or for purchases that are not sanctioned by the Chief Executive Instructions occur occasionally. In these cases cardholders have been required to reimburse the Department. During the 2011-12 financial year there were six such incidences reported in the Certificate of Compliance. They were:

- 1. An APS 5 level staff member mistakenly used their corporate card to pay for parking. The card holder realised the error and repaid the amount.
- 2. A Public Office holder purchased a street directory during travel to escort the President of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission on his visit to Springvale. The purchase was originally considered to be work related but was subsequently deemed to be private and the amount was repaid.
- 3. A Public Office holder used an official card to pay for a taxi fare to attend a Young Professionals Network and Chief Executive Officer breakfast. Advice was subsequently received that attendees were responsible for their own travel and the amount was repaid.
- 4. An APS 6 level staff member inadvertently made a payment of \$43.77 when purchasing privately from a website which had retained the details of an official credit card. The card details were deleted from the website records, the card was cancelled and the amount was repaid.
- 5. A payment of \$14.21 for refreshments was charged by a hotel to an official credit card used to pay for accommodation. The Executive Level 2 cardholder was not advised of the transaction and had not approved it. The amount was repaid.
- 6. An Executive Level 2 staff member was charged personal items on a corporate credit card and corporate expenses on his personal credit card. The staff member refunded the difference of the transactions.

With the exception of the workstations, costs listed above are for the one-off purchase price of the equipment. Ongoing costs for usage of printers, mobile phone plans and data plans for blackberries, iPads and laptops are in addition to these costs and are set in accordance with Whole-of-Government panel pricing arrangements as per table in Question 3 below. To provide an accurate breakdown of ongoing costs for each device for 2009-10, 2010-11 and 2011-12 financial years would involve considerable time and effort and be too resource intensive.

3. Yes. All DVA staff are provided with a standard workstation suite of products (PC or thin client, monitor, phone, keyboard, mouse and desktop software) and support of those products is at an average annual cost of \$4,506.00 per person. Support is provided as a managed service under a Memorandum Of Understanding (MOU) with the Department of Human Services. Equipment and support costs are bundled together into a single charge for services provided to end users and cannot be separately identified.

Other equipment required by staff is issued on a case by case basis following approval of the business requirements for the item. Provision of a detailed breakdown of equipment provided to staff by cost and staff level would involve considerable time and effort and be too resource intensive. However, the following additional electronic equipment is provided by the Department via Whole-of-Government panel arrangements:

- Mobile Phones 351
- Blackberries 77
- iPads 30
- Wireless broadband cards 257

Ongoing costs for phone and data plans and usage associated with mobile phones, blackberries, and wireless broadband services for iPads and Laptops are set in accordance with Whole-of-Government panel pricing arrangements. The current cost for each device type across the whole of the agency, including the Minister and his office, is as follows:

- 1. Yes. The Office of Australian War Graves in Hobart and Launceston purchased a shredder in each location. The total cost for both locations was \$200. The machines were required to shred confidential client information as neither site has a security bin.
- 2. The Department has purchased two shredders since Budget Estimates 2011-12 (May 2012). One was purchased at the cost of \$713.52 for the purpose of destroying hard copies of tenders at the completion of procurement processes, in accordance with the Probity Plan. The shredder has also been used for destroying draft copies of cabinet-in-confidence documents (e.g. New Policy Proposals). The second was purchased at the cost of \$1243.23 for the Darwin Ministerial Office and replaced an existing shredder that had stopped working.

Question 65

The above question contains four parts which are answered individually below.

1. What is your current compliance?

The Department is fully compliant with 32 of the 33 Australian Government Protective Security Policy Framework (PSPF) Compliance Framework mandatory requirements and partially compliant with the remaining directive.

The outstanding directive – 16 PERSEC 3 – states "Agencies must maintain a Designated Security Assessment Position (DSAP) register". The Protective Security Team has developed a DSAP register and is currently in the process of implementing the system on the electronic Human Resource system (HRMS). This will allow for live updates and reporting and ensure ongoing compliance with directive 16. Completion of the DSAP register is expected by March 2013, this falls well inside the required timeframe for compliance of 1 August 2013.

2. What are you doing to manage risk?

The Department has implemented the Security Risk Management framework and practices which have been developed in accordance with:

- The Australian Government Protective Security Policy Framework;
- The Australian Standard AS/NZS ISO 31000:2009 Risk Management Principles and Guidelines; and
- The Australian Standards HB 167:2006 Security risk management.

The Protective Security Team consists of a number of trained risk management professionals who are not only responsible for the development and maintenance of the security polices and protocols, but also provide a number of risk management products including:

- Agency Security Plan;
- International travel assessments and briefings;
- Site security inspections;
- Incident response and assessment;
- Security awareness training for staff and contractors;
- Management of personnel security clearances;
- Information security compliance checks; and
- Risk management register.

- 3. What is being done to comply with the mandatory requirements? Please refer to the answer provided in Part 1.
- 4. Details of any department/agency specific policies and procedures?

The Department has a current Agency Security Plan, a departmental specific Risk Management Plan (including a current Risk Register), and a current Departmental Security Policy document. These documents are supported by eight security protocols covering the following topics:

Question 71

Outcome All: Program All Topic: Carbon Tax (Written Question on Notice)

Senator MCKENZIE asked:

- 1. For the financial year 2011-12, how many kilowatt hour of electricity did the department consume? What was the total cost?
- 2. What does this cost work out to per employee?
- 3. What increases in electricity costs has the Department experienced since the introduction of the carbon tax?
- 4. How has this changed the Department's spending pattern? What programs or services have been cut to meet the increased costs?
- 5. What measures is the Department taking to reduce its electricity expenditure? When did these commence? What impact have they had?

<u>Answer</u>

- 1. For the 2011-12 financial year, the Department consumed 4,244,354 kilowatt hours of electricity, at a cost of \$928,502.
- 2. Based on an actual staffing number of 2,040 at 30 June 2012, the cost per employee is \$455.15. This excludes contractors, consultants and part-time statutory office holders.
- 3. At this stage of the year, not enough data is available to calculate the impact of the carbon tax.
- 4. No there has been no negative impact on programs or services.
- 5. During office fit outs, the Department replaces appliances and lighting in line with the Australian Government and Industry Energy Star standard of 4-stars or greater. Departmental publications and the intranet encourages staff to undertake energy efficient practices, and energy usage is monitored and reported to the National Consultative Forum.

Additionally, the use of thin client computers within the Department assists in power reduction both through device design and system policies. Thin clients use less power as the devices do not require hard drives and fans. This reduction in power is further enhanced by departmental system policies; the first forcing the device to shut itself down after the user logs off, the second forcing the device to shut itself down every morning at 3.00 am in the event that the user has not logged off.

Question 72

Outcome 1: Program 1.6 Topic: Ceased Effects Correspondence (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 125)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Senator RONALDSON: What concerns me though is that, while that is okay for those that you know about, there may well be—in fact, I would think almost definitely there would be—people out there who have received ceased effects correspondence and who are operating under the misapprehension that there is no longer a liability attached to an injury and are accordingly paying their own medical expenses when, quite rightly, those should be payable by the department. What I want to know is this. What, if anything, has been done to make contact with those people? If not, why not, and would you do something about that? I am sure there must be access to information but I put it to you that it is not reasonable to trust information only coming from ESOs because they will not clearly have a sufficient amount of information to address this issue.

Ms Spiers: I understand your question. I am actually not the business owner. The sorts of issues you have raised would be better placed, I think, with one of my colleagues.

Mr Campbell: Senator, I am conscious of the time. I understand the point you are making, so perhaps if I take it on notice to come back to the next estimates hearing with a full report about what we do and what is possible to be done.

Senator RONALDSON: Thank you for that offer but could I put another proposal, that maybe I could tick-tack with someone from your office or Mr Farrelly to clarify exactly what the issues are. **Mr Campbell:** In that case, it would be Mr Farrelly. I am quite comfortable for you to do that and for your office to talk to Mr Farrelly.

Senator RONALDSON: Yes, I can talk to him.

Mr Campbell: Then, if needs be, we can come back to the next hearing.

Answer

DVA will identify claimants who may have been issued with a 'ceased effects' notification and will contact them if possible. The ESO Roundtable was briefed on this approach on 9 November 2012.

DVA is developing a communication strategy to ensure that the veteran community is aware of the removal of the 'ceased effects' policy and invite veterans to contact the Department if they require any support for their previously accepted conditions such as medical treatment.

Question 73

Outcome 1: Program 1.4 Topic: BEST funding (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Can the Department give an explanation for the inaccuracies to QoN 11 from Additional Budget Estimates in February 2012? What steps has the Department taken to ensure the accuracy of answers provided to QoN through the Estimates process?

Answer

The inaccuracies to Question on Notice 11 from Additional Budget Estimates in February 2012 were due to administrative errors after all clearances had been obtained, when a departmental officer was tabling the detailed grants listing.

DVA has reviewed its Question on Notice processes, which has resulted in additional resources being added to the team, plus the introduction of a more rigorous Quality Assurance process, to ensure such errors are not repeated.

Question 74

Outcome 1: Program 1.4 Topic: Best Funding (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Have BEST grants been frozen as per the freeze announced by the Government in the Mid Year Economic and Fiscal Outlook? If yes, what impact will this have on the provision of grants to support volunteer veterans advocates and pension officers in the community?

Answer

No.

Question 75

Outcome 1: Program 1.4 Topic: Best Funding (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Why were successful BEST grant applications not notified until 27 July 2012 of the success or otherwise of their application? Why were those details not released before the start of the financial year in which the grants apply?

Answer

The Department conducted consultation with its ex-service organisation round table (ESORT). During these meetings it was agreed that applying a funding formula to claims workload statistics supplied on application forms was the most equitable way of granting funds. These consultations delayed the opening of BEST Round 14.

An initial brief with funding recommendations was sent to the Minister's office on 13 July 2012. A subsequent brief including additional organisations was sent to the Minister's office on 25 July 2012. This was agreed by the Minister on 26 July 2012 and grant agreements were sent to successful applicants on 1 August 2012.

Question 76

Outcome 1: Program 1.4 Topic: BEST Funding (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

On what date did the Department advise the Minister of the total value of applications for 2012-13? On what date did the Minister make his decision to exclude welfare work from consideration in the application of grant funding?

Answer

The Minister was formally advised of the total value of requests for BEST funding for the financial year 2012-13 on 13 July 2012, as part of the first brief recommending eligible organisations for the Minister's consideration. The Minister signed the brief on 17 July 2012.

A subsequent brief, sent to the Minister's office on 25 July 2012 and signed by the Minister on 26 July 2012, recommended additional organisations receive BEST funding.

The decision on whether to include welfare hours in the funding formula to be applied to workload statistics of eligible applicants was not made until after the final consultation meeting with the ex-service organisation round table held on 26 June 2012. The Minister agreed to this approach when he was presented with the brief on 13 July 2012, which he signed on 17 July 2012.

- 1. How many Service Delivery Integration grants were applied for and approved in 2011-12? Which organisations applied and were successful? What was the value of each grant?
- 2. Was the full \$1.5m for SDI grants fully allocated? If not, where was this money spent?

<u>Answer</u>

 In <u>Phase One</u> - 34 SDI applications were received in 2011-12. Of these, 23 were approved for funding and 11 did not request monetary grants, but committed to undertake feasibility studies.

In <u>Phase Two</u> – 28 SDI applications were received in 2011-12. Of these, 21 organisations were approved for funding. A further six applicants were not recommended for funding and one applicant requested nil funding.

For successful organisations and the value of each grant - see tables in Attachment A.

<u>Note</u>: Although Coffs Harbour Legacy (sponsoring the Coffs Harbour Legacy Group) received approval for a grant of \$45,545.55 (GST excl) in Phase 2, the group declined the grant due to the organisations' inability to implement the program.

2. Of the \$1.5m, \$800,000 was provided to 66 ESOs in BEST Round 13 (2011-12) as a one-off transition payment. In addition, \$665,963 (GST excl) was provided to ESOs in the form of Phase 1 and Phase 2 SDI grants. A total of \$34,037 (GST excl) has not been allocated.

Question 80

Outcome 1: Program 1.4 Topic: BEST Funding (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

In Round 14, how many organisations which were successful in receiving an SDI grant received increased funding under BEST?

Answer

Of the 21 Phase 2 SDI Grant recipients, 14 received more funds in BEST Round 14 than they did in BEST Round 13. This excludes transition funding.

Question 81

Outcome 1: Program 1.4 Topic: BEST Funding (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

In Round 14, what were the total value of BEST grants provided to Tasmania? Will the Department provide a breakdown of the successful organisations and a breakdown of funding to Tasmania since 2005-06? If there has been a reduction in funds to Tasmania, can the Department explain the reasons for this?

Answer

The total value of BEST grants provided to ex-service organisations from Tasmania for BEST Round 14 (2012-13) was \$85,203.38 (GST Inc).

The table below shows BEST funded applicants in Tasmania in the 2005-06 financial year to the 2012-13 financial year.

The amount allocated to Tasmania has reduced in line with the overall BEST funding reduction of \$1 million per year commencing in 2011-12. As in previous years, funding was notionally allocated on the basis of each State and Territory's percentage share of the total veteran beneficiary population.

The amount received by the BEST Joint Venture has reduced. Prior to Round 14, the BEST Joint Venture received funding assistance for rent. The Service Delivery Integration Grant of \$101,217.29 (GST Inc) to the RSL Tasmania in 2012, sponsoring the BEST Joint Venture, provided funding to implement avenues for eliminating rental costs. The BEST grant to the Joint Venture in Round 14 reflected the removal of funding assistance for rent.

Question 82

Outcome 1: Program 1.4 Topic: BEST Funding (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

A report in the Sunday Times on 30 September 2012 points to a reduction in funding to Perth Legacy. Can the Department explain the reasons for this reduction in funding to Perth Legacy and provide funding details for Round 14 including funding sought and granted.

<u>Answer</u>

In BEST Round 14 (2012-13), Perth Legacy sought a BEST grant of \$225,106 and received \$83,766.45 (GST Inc). This compares to \$218,550 requested and \$145,108 received (including a one-off supplement of \$35,359.27 to assist with the transition to lower levels of BEST funding) in BEST Round 13 (2011-12).

The priority for funding in Round 14 funding was to support the claims and pension work of ESOs. The ESO Round Table consensus was that the claims and appeals workload formula should be used in Round 14. Perth Legacy indicated on its application form that the majority of its workload hours is spent on welfare activities and they received a 'grandfathered' welfare salary payment for BEST Round 14.

In Question on Notice 55 from Budget Estimates in May the Department indicated that a review was presently underway into the Veterans' Children's Education Scheme and the 'link' between the rate of payment and the rate of Youth Allowance. Has this review progressed? When is it expected to be finalised? Will the Department provide a copy of this report to the committee?

<u>Answer</u>

The review has been finalised and Government is considering it in the context of Budget 2013-14. It cannot be provided at this time.

Question 84

Outcome 1: Program 1.6 Topic: Compensation for Impairment under MRCA for Warlike and Non-warlike Service (Written Question on Notice)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

Could you please advise if there is any difference in the entitlements paid under MRCA when Permanent Impairment is found for those whose service is classified as 'non-warlike' compared with 'warlike' service?

Answer

No, there is no difference in the permanent impairment compensation amounts arising from warlike service compared to non-warlike service, as they are both classified as *operational service*.

Question 85

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Booked Car With Driver - Complaints (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 124)

Senator RONALDSON:

Senator RONALDSON: Will you provide me with a complaints update, please? I do not know whether it was for New South Wales, but, if my memory serves me correctly, we had 80 complaints up until March of this year for the financial year, and then some 270-odd after that. I think that was the evidence given at the last estimates hearing. If that is incorrect then I will stand corrected. It was certainly quite dramatic. Can you provide me on notice with details, please. **Dr McPaul:** We can do it on notice. I have those details.

Answer

As at 30 September 2012, DVA arranged 530,223 trips nationally since commencing new service arrangements on 1 March 2012. There were 268 complaints received nationally in the period 1 March 2012 to 30 June 2012. In the period 1 July 2012 to 30 September 2012 the total number of complaints nationally was 114.

The tables below show the number of Booked Car With Driver (BCWD) complaints is trending downwards over the past few months, primarily as a result of the Department's liaison with transport providers, ex-service organisations and veterans. The number of complaints received in the July to September 2012 period has reduced by 50 per cent on from the number of complaints received in the first three months after implementation (March to May 2012).

Question 86

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Booked Car With Driver Service (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Can the Department explain the 'spike' in complaints in Victoria in the 2011-12 financial year? What were the reasons for this and what steps were put in place to rectify the situation?

In order to improve service to the veteran community and therefore reduce the number of complaints, DVA has been actively liaising with a number of transport providers and state Taxi Councils. DVA has also provided input into the 13 Cabs and Geelong Cabs driver training program.

DVA arranged for senior executives from the taxi industry to provide an information session at the Victorian Deputy Commissioner's ESO Consultative Forum which was well received.

DVA has also met with a number of veteran groups and transport providers in country Victoria and provided presentations on client service expectations to members of the Country Victoria Taxi

Operators Association. There has been regular liaison and follow up meetings with veterans attending the Older Veterans PTSD Program at Heidelberg Hospital.

In association with the VIC Taxi Council, DVA has been involved in publishing a number of industry magazine/journal articles specifically aimed at driver performance standards.

DVA is currently working with major providers in Victoria to design and deliver professional development training for driver trainers. It is anticipated that key personnel from major health facilities and ex-service organisations will participate.

The training makes it clear that most of the Department's clients are elderly and require additional assistance. This assistance is not limited to when a veteran enters or exits the vehicle, but assistance may also be required to ensure seat belts are properly secured. The training also makes it clear that drivers should park as close as possible to their destination and on arrival at a veteran's residence, knock on the front door. The training specifically identifies the important standing of veterans and war widow/ers in our community and aims to heighten driver understanding of the veteran community.

With most large taxi companies, drivers need to be accredited by their network through the completion of a veteran driver course before they can undertake the Department's work. The Department monitors the complaints received from the ex-service community and may suggest removing a driver from the Department's work if there is a track record of poor service. Some networks and state regulators also impose mandatory remedial training for drivers with poor track records.

DVA's service requirements are set out in the Booked Car Scheme Guidelines for Taxi and Hire Car Contractors which are available on the internet at:

In association with the NSW and VIC Taxi Councils, the Department has also been involved in publishing a number of industry magazine/journal articles specifically aimed at driver performance standards.

The Department is currently working with major providers in Victoria and NSW to develop and deliver professional development training for driver trainers. It is anticipated that key personnel from major health facilities and ESOs will participate.

Question 91

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Booked Car with Driver Service (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

With regards to the tenders provided for work in the Bribie Island region:

- a) The Minister indicates in a letter to me that there was 'increasing workload" on Bribie Island. What is the nature of this increasing workload and how is this measured?
- b) Was the issue of increasing workload ever raised with the previous sole provider? If yes, what was the outcome?

Answer

a) There has been an increase in the amount of Booked Car With Driver (BCWD) work occurring on Bribie Island. This reflects the increase in BCWD work that is occurring nationwide, and is commensurate with the ageing treatment population, and their increased reliance on the BCWD scheme.

In early 2011, the Department introduced a new Transport Booking and Invoicing System (TBIS) which records all of the BCWD Departmental arranged trips, and enables better monitoring of workload trends. Transport bookings are allocated to providers in specific geographic areas of operation. In March 2012, the Department slightly amended the Bribie Island geographic area of operation to include some additional surrounding suburbs. This amendment facilitates better booking procedures.

b) The workload changes were not discussed with Mr Goold of Bribie Bayside Cab Company, the previous sole transport provider. Mr Goold has, however, repeatedly advised the Department that he operates a small company. Due to the volume of work undertaken, the Department identified that multiple providers would assist to service this area and meet veteran demand.

Question 92

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Booked Car With Driver Service (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

The Minister indicates that 'veteran satisfaction levels assist in determining the future allocation of work to transport providers':

- a) With regard to the work in Caboolture-Bribie Island area, what was the previous sole-provider's satisfaction level?
- b) Has the satisfaction level remained or increased since the new arrangements came into place on 1 March 2012?
- c) Has any analysis been undertaken to determine satisfaction levels in the area since the new tender began?
- d) If yes, to (c), what has the outcome been?
- e) What is the overall level of satisfaction with the service in the Bribie Island area?

Answer

- a) Overall the veteran community indicated satisfaction with the level of service provided by Bribie Bayside Cab Company.
- b) Overall the veteran community continues to be satisfied with the level of service provided by Bribie Bayside Cab Company and Black and White Cabs.
- c) Yes.
- d) The Department continues to liaise closely with ex-service organisations (ESOs), transport providers and health providers, to enhance the quality of service to veterans. An integral component of this approach is the investigation of all transport complaints. This is undertaken as part of the Department's nationwide routine business operations. Some complaints were received about the additional transport provider in Bribie Island, Black and White Cabs. The Department raised these concerns with Black and White Cabs, who has introduced a number of enhancements to address these complaints. These enhancements include: engaging with local ESOs to better understand veteran needs; enhancing the driver training program to ensure drivers understand veterans' transport needs; and relocating some prestige vehicles for use on Bribie Island as well as modifying their dispatch processes.

Complaints have been received from a small group of veterans who have a preference to travel with Bribie Bayside Cab Company, and utilise the services of the local provider rather than one based on the mainland.

The Department will continue to liaise with Black and White Cabs to ensure the agreed service enhancements are maintained, and is confident that the improvements to the overall quality of service to veterans will continue.

Additionally, the Department has been involved in a number of meetings with ESOs in Bribie Island, including representatives of the War Widows' Guild of Queensland and the Vietnam Veterans' Centre on Bribie Island.

e) As recently as October 2012, the representatives from the War Widows' Guild of Queensland and the Vietnam Veterans' Centre on Bribie Island have advised that they are satisfied with the improvements and service currently provided.

As a result of the ongoing enhancements made by Black and White Cabs, the Department is satisfied with the overall level of service in the Bribie Island area. The Department will continue to liaise with ESOs, transport providers and health providers, and monitor the service provided on Bribie Island.

Question 93

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Booked Car with Driver Service (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Does DVA operate a 'preferred supplier' relationship with taxi companies in Queensland for work under the Booked Car With Driver service? Has the Queensland Government raised any concerns with this arrangement with the Department? If yes, what was the outcome?

Answer

The Department has contracts with 57 transport providers in Queensland. There are no 'preferred supplier' relationships with any of the contracted transport providers, and therefore no concerns from the Queensland Government have been raised regarding 'preferred suppliers'.

The Department's contracts with the transport providers do not guarantee any volume of work to any provider.

As the transport industry is regulated at the state/territory level, the Department relies on transport providers being compliant with the relevant state/territory transport regulations. Where issues have been raised concerning the operation of suppliers in Queensland, the Department has contacted the Queensland Department of Transport and Main Roads to seek advice.

Question 94

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Booked Car With Driver Service (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Can a veteran request that they are transported by a particular provider? If yes, how does this work?

Answer

Generally, no. If a veteran prefers to travel with a particular provider or by a particular mode of transport they can arrange their own travel and pay the provider of their choice directly and subsequently seek reimbursement from the Department by submitting a claim for travelling expenses.

There are provisions for customising travel for some veterans based on their clinical high needs such as for dementia and dialysis patients. These however, are exceptional cases which require manual processing and monitoring.

In order to meet a person's clinical needs, the Department can request the dispatch of certain types of vehicles such as wheelchair vehicles, large sedans or a front seat requirement.

Question 95

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Booked Car with Driver Service (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Where there are multiple transport providers in one location, is work provided on a 'random' basis, particularly work for long-distance travel?

Answer

For short distance travel, the Department's Transport Booking & Invoicing System randomly selects a provider from a panel of providers in a geographic operation region based on predefined workload allocation percentages. The workload allocation percentages are determined based on the transport provider's vehicle capacity, the availability of wheelchair accessible vehicles and the transport provider's geographical area of coverage.

Long distance travel bookings constitute a small proportion of the overall transport bookings. Long distance bookings are allocated to contracted transport providers by a departmental officer who allocates the work based on predefined workload percentages for the providers in that operating region. Only those providers who tendered successfully for long distance work are allocated long distance jobs. The Department dispatches long distance work to the transport provider two days prior to the travel as it is a contractual requirement to contact and confirm the pickup details with the veteran.

Question 96

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Mental Health – Research Programs (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 110-111)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

Senator WRIGHT: First of all, I am going to ask if you can provide details of research into PTSD or any other mental health effects of combat or military service that is currently being undertaken, conducted or commissioned by DVA or any other government body? **Ms Daniel:** We run a number of research programs. We run what is called the Applied Research Program, which conducts a range of research programs. We also fund ACPMH, the Australian Centre for Posttraumatic Mental Health, and the Centre for Military and Veterans' Health. Through all of those channels, we have conducted a reasonably extensive program of research, program evaluation, investigative research and innovative development. We could take you through some of the details of the specifics of some of those research activities if you wished. **Senator WRIGHT:** Yes; if you would not mind doing that briefly, I would appreciate that. Then, could you direct me to where else I could get further information.

Ms Daniel: I have just looked very quickly at applied research projects related to mental health and post-traumatic stress disorder. We funded ACPMH to do a project on gender differences in mental health among military personnel and veterans—a review of the literature. That is under contract negotiation. We have a current project with ACPMH on a meta-analysis of gender difference in post-traumatic stress disorder treatment outcomes. We have looked at depression in Australian Gulf War veterans; we have done that through Monash and the Murdoch Childrens Research Institute. We have done a systematic review of psychological disorder, multi-symptom disorder and chronic fatigue for the Gulf War, Iraq War and Afghanistan with Monash. We have a current project with CMVH around a comparison of DVA clients, ADF members and the general populations' responses to the 2007 National Survey of Mental Health and Wellbeing. We have done some research work with ACPMH on CBCS and the cognitive processing therapy. We have done a literature review of static load—and I am reading a full list here for you. We have done a literature review with CMVH around NTBI. We have done a project on the long term outcomes for CBCS centre based counselling; I think we mentioned this last time that CMVH evaluated our post-traumatic stress disorder group treatment program. We undertook a review of Operation Life workshops through Griffith University. We have done some work around dementia and PTSD with the University of Melbourne. We have a current project—another one—on Gulf war veterans; and, obviously, the study which we mentioned in response to your question on notice about suicide; a complete project-and I will not go right back-but-

Senator WRIGHT: So how far back have you gone at this stage, Ms Daniel? Have you gone back in chronological order? Is that pretty much how it has been?

Ms Daniel: My list started with our current projects.

Senator WRIGHT: And you have worked backwards then? Where did you get to in terms of chronology?

Ms Daniel: I do not have the dates on me.

Senator WRIGHT: That is fine.

Ms Daniel: If it was helpful to you, we can summarise that list for you on notice.

Senator WRIGHT: That would be very good. Thank you very much.

Ms Daniel: Just the names of the projects that are current and complete, back for a certain period.

Senator WRIGHT: That would be good, thank you very much. Perhaps for a period of 10 years would be good. How far did you go? I am not sure.Ms Daniel: Two or three years is more than is necessary.Senator WRIGHT: Thank you.

Question 97

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Mental Health Impacts - Comparison (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 111)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

Senator WRIGHT: Thank you. I am interested now in exploring, given the changing nature of warfare and the difference in the social context of current deployments, does the department have data on the anticipated mental health impacts of service personnel returning from recent conflict zones like Afghanistan or Iraq, including but not limited to the expected rate of mental illness and the differences in type and prevalence of mental ill health conditions compared with previous service or conflicts, and any other relevant matters. In a sense, someway of starting to have an overview of the prevalence of and differences in the conditions that current veterans might be experiencing?

Ms Daniel: I might make a couple of general comments and then, depending on your interest, ask Dr Stephanie Hodson to talk a little about the prevalence study. We have, and we did not have previously, obviously, the extensive study that Defence has undertaken on the prevalence of mental health conditions in the current forces. We are looking at that in terms of what it might mean for future demands for the department. Obviously, we have looked too at what has happened with historical patterns, for example, Vietnam. Stephanie was part of the research team for that prevalence study so, if it was of interest to you, she could talk you through some of the key findings that are relevant to us.

Senator WRIGHT: I am just conscious of the time that I have available. I would like to hear from you in person, Dr Hodson, but I think maybe it might be better to take that question on notice, if that would be all right, because I have a few things I need to get through.

Answer

In the last decade there have been significant advances in our knowledge of military mental illness, in terms of prevalence, diagnosis and treatment. Unlike previous conflicts where the research undertaken was retrospective, current research has been conducted as the war has been underway. This is resulting in fundamental shifts in our understanding of the impact of deployment, as well as exposure to combat and military trauma.

Within Australia, work is underway to establish the impact of the current deployments on personnel. The Military Health Outcomes Program (MilHOP) is a program of studies looking at both the physical and mental health impacts for service personnel returning from recent conflict zones including Afghanistan and Iraq. It has been developed jointly by the Department of Defence and the Centre for Military and Veterans' Health (CMVH) at the Universities of Adelaide and Queensland. The CMVH research centre receives core funding from the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) and in-kind support from the Department of Defence.

MilHOP includes four studies, including the:

- 2010 Mental Health Prevalence and Wellbeing Study, which studied the most common mental health disorders, optimal mental health screening cut-offs and the impact of occupational stressors on serving personnel, released in October 2011.
- Middle East Area of Operations (MEAO) Health Study, which is looking at the health of ADF personnel who deployed to the MEAO between 2001 and 2009. The summary report has been submitted to the Department of Defence and is currently being considered.
- MEAO Prospective Health Study, which is investigating changes in health outcomes by assessing ADF personnel before and after deploying to the MEAO in 2010 and 2011. The summary report has been submitted to the Department of Defence and is currently being considered.
- MEAO Mortality and Cancer Incidence Studies, which are to determine any relationships between mortality and/or cancer incidence among ADF personnel who deployed, as well as personnel who could have, but did not deploy to the MEAO between 2001 and 2010.

The 2010 Mental Health Prevalence and Wellbeing Study is the first of the studies in the program to be finalised. It is a landmark study for policy and program development for serving personnel and the ex-service community, as it provides evidence to assist in the development of strategies and programs to meet the emerging needs of contemporary veterans and former serving personnel.

A strength of the study is the ability to compare the serving population with the general community. These comparisons were based on a sample from the 2007 National Mental Health and Wellbeing Survey which was matched to ensure the same demographic profile, that is primarily young, male and employed.

Key findings of the study include:

- the prevalence of mental health disorder in serving personnel in any twelve month period is similar to the Australian community (22 per cent in the Defence Force compared to 20.7 per cent in the general community), however the prevalence of specific disorders was different and reflected the hazards of military service;
- the rate of PTSD is higher in serving personnel than the general community. (8.3 per cent for the Defence Force compared to 5.2 per cent general community for the past 12 months);
- the rate of depressive episodes is also higher (6.4 per cent for the Defence Force compared to 3.1 per cent for the general community for the past 12 months); and
- the life time prevalence is higher in serving personnel (54.1 per cent for the Defence Force compared to 49.3 per cent for the general community), with over half of the ADF experiencing an anxiety, affective (mood) or alcohol use disorder in their lifetime.

The study highlighted the specific risks of military service, especially the link between the level of traumatic exposure and mental health outcomes. The study also highlighted the barriers to military personnel seeking care, including impact on ability to deploy, fear that it will impact their future career and a belief they will be seen as weak. This knowledge gives DVA valuable information to assist in the design of future mental health initiatives, and where effort needs to be targeted in prevention, early intervention, and treatment.

Question 98

Outcome 2: Program 2.5 Topic: Health and Medical Research (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 123)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Senator RONALDSON: I turn to program 2.5 of the PBS, containing a line item for health and medical research. I gather this is an applied research grants program of approximately \$2.4 million. Is that correct? If so, can you take on notice please, to provide a full list of programs funded since 2007-08; a full list of project applications under the program, noting whether they were successful for a grant and the amount funding which was sought and subsequently granted or indeed subsequently denied; and what completed research papers have resulted in the department making changes to the way services are provided to veterans, widows or their families? **Ms Daniel:** We will take that question on notice.

Answer

The Health and medical research (Applied Research) sub-program (ARP) is funded through a specific appropriation under Program 2.5 Veterans' Counselling and Health Services. The ARP funds individual projects and operates as a fee for service program relying on contract deliverables for payment.

A list of projects funded since 2007-2008 is at Attachment A.

A full list of applications under the program, noting whether they were endorsed (successful), not endorsed (unsuccessful) or still under consideration, including the amount of funding sought, is at <u>Attachment B</u>.

The ARP commissions research that plays a vital role in the strategic development, implementation and improvement of DVA policy and contributes to the advancement of models for healthcare and service delivery. Examples of ARP funded research that has directly influenced the Department's policy and service delivery to veterans, widows or their families include, but are not limited to:

- Research into the relationship between ADF service and specific medical conditions assisted DVA's identification process of conditions for which a modified claims process may be justifiable¹.
- Research into the implementation and effectiveness of Cognitive Processing Therapy (CPT) for Vietnam Veterans Counselling Service (VVCS) clients with Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)². This study was the first Australian trial of CPT in a naturalistic community service setting and is a world leading contribution to effective research for PTSD. This evidence based intervention was positively accepted by both clients and counsellors of VVCS and represents an important step forward for the treatment of combat-related PTSD in Australian veterans in the future.

- Various health studies that contribute towards developing early intervention strategies for younger veterans to prevent or reduce long-term psychological ill-health.³
- Research that assisted in the development of, and continues to provide support to, the DVA Veterans' Medicines Advice and Therapeutics Education Service (Veterans MATES) to improve the use of medicines in the veteran community.⁴
- Data analysis projects that assist DVA business areas to effectively plan and project service needs and cost structures.⁵
- Research that has improved understanding of women in the military and increased awareness of women as an increasingly important veteran group.⁶
- Research that highlighted directions for VVCS service development towards treatment and developing partnerships with primary care providers, such as general practitioners and secondary care providers.⁷
- Research that assists DVA to investigate e-health opportunities.⁸
- Development of best practice mental health pathways for community nursing for veterans and war widows.⁹
- Research that contributes towards DVA's ongoing provision of health services for veterans ie Veterans' Home Care Preventable Hospital Admissions (now called Coordinated Veterans' Care Program).¹⁰
- Research that contributes towards DVA's rehabilitation programs for veterans.¹¹
- Research that resulted in the RMA changing the Standard Operating Procedures for diabetes mellitus.¹²
- Research that contributed to DVA's understanding veteran homelessness.¹³

As well as rehearsals for the Rededication conducted with ADF and families on 5 November, this role also included providing support to the Z Unit veteran and carer (invited by the Minister) and to the families of the Z Unit personnel whose graves were being rededicated.
- e) Nominees must have been Australian veterans who served in the Kokoda and Beachheads campaign in 1942-43, or either campaign. All nominating veterans underwent a prima facie assessment to establish fitness for travel. This included the provision of information from the veteran and their doctor. Those short listed were then assessed by the Department's Principal Medical Adviser.

Question 104

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Recognition in the Australian War Memorial (Written Question on Notice)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

Has research or other work been conducted by the department into including Australian Peacekeepers who have died in humanitarian, post-Armistice and peacekeeping (non-warlike) operations on the Honour Roll at the Australian War Memorial (AWM)?

Answer

The Australian War Memorial (AWM) has conducted recent research into Honour Rolls policy, precedence and eligibility, paying particular attention to the issue of peacekeepers and other non-warlike deaths. An issues paper was prepared to brief the AWM Council for its November meeting. A press release of 13 November 2012 can be found on the Australian War Memorial website at the following link:

Question 105

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Recognition in the Australian War Memorial (Written Question on Notice)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

I understand the Remembrance Book at the AWM, which contains the names of the 48 men and women who died in humanitarian, post-Armistice and peacekeeping (non-warlike) operations is currently insufficiently displayed. I have been informed that it is kept in a locked cabinet, with signage that only recognises the Commemorative and therefore the service of other allied forces, Red Cross, Australian Comforts Fund, YMCA, war correspondents, artists, photographers, munitions and other workers, but the only visible recognition of the deaths in humanitarian, post-Armistice and peacekeeping (non-warlike) operations is a small label attached to the Remembrance Book. Can you confirm this is correct?

Answer

Since its dedication on 11 November 2007, the Remembrance Book has been on display alongside the Commemorative Roll in a glass-lidded cabinet. This cabinet is located in the Memorial's Commemorative Area, in an alcove adjacent to the Roll of Honour. While staff can easily unlock the cabinet upon request, and have been happy to do so, the Memorial has recently removed the glass lid for a trial period so that visitors can access the Rolls directly. This new arrangement will be monitored to gauge how much incidental damage might be done to the Books under this new arrangement.

Both the Commemorative Roll and the Remembrance Book have their own explanatory signage inside the cabinet. The exact words on the labels are below.

Commemorative Roll

This Roll commemorates Australians who died during or as a result of those conflicts included in the Roll of Honour, but who were members of the armed forces of allied countries, the Merchant Navy, or philanthropic organisation.

The Commemorative Roll also includes official war correspondents; photographers or artists; munitions and other workers; and official historians.

Persons listed in this Roll must have been born in Australia, or have had Australia as their last place of domicile.

Remembrance Book

The Remembrance Book commemorates all those members of the Australian Defence Force and members of the Australian police forces who have died during or as a result of operations after 30 June 1947 designated as non-warlike service or its equivalent, including hazardous service or peacekeeping service or humanitarian peacetime service.

The bronze plaque above the cabinet was installed many years ago, before the Remembrance Book was created, and relates only to the Commemorative Roll. The text on the plaque has recently been reviewed and a new plaque is being made which will refer to both the Commemorative Roll and the Remembrance Book. It will be installed shortly.

Question 106

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Recognition in the Australian War Memorial (Written Question on Notice)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

Has the Department undertaken any review of the signage of the Remembrance Book?

Answer

Yes, a review has been undertaken of both the bronze plaque above the cabinet which houses the Commemorative Roll and the Remembrance Book in the Commemorative Area, as well as the labels inside the cabinet. The plaque above the cabinet was installed many years ago, before the Remembrance Book was created, and currently relates only to the Commemorative Roll. As a result of the review, a new plaque will be cast which will provide information about both the Commemorative Roll and the Remembrance Book. It will be installed shortly.

The labels in the cabinet were updated in September 2012 to reflect a change in the wording of the eligibility criteria for the Remembrance Book. The labels were updated again following the removal of the glass in the cabinet just prior to Remembrance Day 2012. This amendment simply removed reference to asking for assistance to see a specific page. The exact words on the labels are below.

Commemorative Roll

This Roll commemorates Australians who died during or as a result of those conflicts included in the Roll of Honour, but who were members of the armed forces of allied countries, the Merchant Navy, or philanthropic organisation.

The Commemorative Roll also includes official war correspondents; photographers or artists; munitions and other workers; and official historians.

Persons listed in this Roll must have been born in Australia, or have had Australia as their last place of domicile.

Remembrance Book

The Remembrance Book commemorates all those members of the Australian Defence Force and members of the Australian police forces who have died during or as a result of operations after 30 June 1947 designated as non-warlike service or its equivalent, including hazardous service or peacekeeping service or humanitarian peacetime service.

Question 107

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: The Australian Peacekeeping Memorial (Written Question on Notice)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

How much Commonwealth funding has been allocated in the Australian War Memorial project since 2003? (please provide details of the amounts allocated in each Budget, and the total amount)

- a) Of this funding, how much has been spent?
- b) What is the current status of construction/project completion?
- c) When is the project scheduled to be completed?

Answer

The Australian Peacekeeping Memorial on ANZAC Parade is the responsibility of the National Capital Authority.

The Government provided a discretionary grant of \$200,000 in 2006 to the Australian National Peacekeeping Memorial Project Committee.

The Department is unable to provide any comment on funding, project status or schedule for completion.

Question 108

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Australian Peacekeeping Memorial (Written Question on Notice)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

- 1. Can you explain the reasoning behind the revocation of Deductible Gift Recipient Status of the Australian Peacekeeping Memorial project in 2009?
 - a) If this was a compliance issue, has the Department conducted any work since then into the course of action needed to meet requirements in order to reinstate Deductible Gift Recipient Status of the Australian Peacekeeping Memorial project?

Answer:

 The Australian Peacekeeping Memorial Project was originally listed as a deductible gift recipient (DGR) under Division 30 of the *Income Tax Assessment Act 1997* from 30 April 2007 to 31 December 2008. A date-defined listing is standard practice for a project expected to take place in a limited timeframe. The Australian Peacekeeping Memorial Project DGR status was not revoked, it simply lapsed at the time that it had been legislated to end.

Question 109

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Representation for Younger Veterans (Written Question on Notice)

Senator Wright asked:

Does the Department have data on the inclusion of young Veterans groups in national forums/ESOs such as the National Advisory Committee (by younger Veterans I refer to Peacekeepers, and those who have service in war-like service from 1989 onwards)?

Answer

The National Advisory Committee (NAC) for the Veterans and Veterans Families Counselling Service (VVCS) currently has eight members including the Chair (who is a veteran). One member represents the interests of younger veterans, one member represents the interests of peacekeepers and peacemakers, one member represents the interests of partners and families, and one member represents the interests of sons and daughters. In addition, the NAC has a member who represents the interests of Vietnam veterans, together with a psychiatrist and a general medical practitioner. Below is a list of current NAC members. Question 110

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Representation for Younger Veterans (Written Question on Notice)

Senator Wright asked:

Is the Department making any moves to increase the representation of younger Veterans in existing forums/ESOs, or develop new platforms for the representation of younger Veterans?

Answer

The Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA) National Consultation Framework was established in 2009 to provide a more formal channel for consultation that better suits today's ex-service and defence communities. The framework includes the current and former members of the Australian Defence Force (ADF) – Emerging Issues Forum which considers issues affecting younger ADF members and their families. To date, the ex-service organisations that attend the various forums within the National Consultation Framework independently nominate their own representatives to attend meetings, who may or may not be younger veterans.

The Department is reviewing consultation arrangements and frameworks with consideration of possible greater inclusion of younger veterans.

Question 111

Outcome 1: Program 1.2 and 1.6 Topic: On Base Advisory Service (OBAS) (Written Question on Notice)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

Please provide an update on the current status of OBAS – including data from the last 5 years on client numbers, referrals, and successful primary claims.

Answer

OBAS does not specifically take or process claims. The purpose of OBAS is to help serving members find out about DVA services, including compensation, health services, rehabilitation and support. The service is provided by specially trained DVA staff located on over 35 bases around Australia. OBAS was implemented on 1 October 2011.

Client Numbers

Between 1 October 2011 when the service was implemented until 31 October 2012, there have been 7,134 member enquiries.

Referrals

The following table shows the number and source of referral of clients to OBAS since the service was implemented on 1 October 2011 until 31 October 2012:

Question 112

Outcome 1: Program 1.2 & 1.6 Topic: On Base Advisory Service (OBAS) (Written Question on Notice)

Senator WRIGHT asked:

Has the department received any feedback on the effectiveness/success of OBAS?

Answer

The reaction from Defence is very positive. The Australian Defence Force is working with DVA to implement the service and ensure connections with its rehabilitation, medical and transition areas. Deputy Commissioners have provided feedback that the members themselves are appreciative of the convenience of the service.

OBAS staff are seeing an increased demand for appointments with them. For example, in one case, DVA has needed to provide an additional Adviser two days a week to help with the current work load and in some cases, appointments can be booked up to two weeks in advance.

Some ex-service organisations have also provided positive feedback to DVA on OBAS. The TPI Association (NSW) has reported an increased workload since OBAS began.

Question 113

Outcome 3: Program 3.2 Topic: Granting of DGR Status (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Senator RONALDSON: Has the minister written to the Treasurer seeking this matter to be expedited so at least you are in a position to make a decision if there are funds that become available within the portfolio?

Mr Campbell: There are a number of DGR status issues around the portfolio at the moment, as you are aware. I know there have been discussions between the minister and the Assistant Treasurer and the minister's office and the Assistant Treasurer's office. I could not say whether or not an actual letter in respect of this has been written to the Assistant Treasurer, but I do know that the minister has raised it in government forums.

Senator RONALDSON: What do you mean by 'government forums'?

Mr Campbell: In the budgetary context.

Senator RONALDSON: So was the request made for it to be-

Mr Campbell: No, it- Senator RONALDSON: For Treasury during the budget-

Mr Campbell: No. I meant in the forthcoming budgetary context-that is, the 2013-14 budget. **Senator RONALDSON**: When was the application first lodged?

Mr Campbell: I would have to take that on notice. As I think you and I both know, it did actually

have DGR status some years ago and that lapsed.

Senator RONALDSON: I was just about to raise that.

Mr Campbell: I was not in the portfolio at that time. As you know, that was when I was away doing something else. So I would have to take on notice the actual date.

Answer:

1. The Australian Peacekeeping Memorial Project requested renewal of its DGR listing in a letter to the then Assistant Treasurer, the Hon Nick Sherry, dated 21 January 2009. On 21 December 2012, the Assistant Treasurer, the Hon David Bradbury MP, wrote to the Chairman of the Australian Peacekeeping Memorial Project advising him that the Government had agreed to the provision of DGR status for the Australian Peacekeeping Memorial Project through specific listing by name in the tax law, for the period 1 January 2013 to 31 December 2014.

Question 114

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Letter to Treasurer – DGR Status (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 95)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Senator RONALDSON: Apart from the discussions in the context of next year's budget, has there been anything in writing or any discussions that pre-dated the May 2013 budget discussions? Mr Campbell: In the last two to three years—and I think I am going back to the time of the original commission on the Centenary of ANZAC—there have been discussions within government of both the peacekeepers memorial and the Boer War memorial, and both of those discussions have been around funding and around the granting of DGR status. Senator RONALDSON: Just so we are clear, the minister has not written to the Treasurer supporting the DGR status or asking him for the matter to be expedited?

Mr Campbell: You have asked a specific question about writing, and I will take that on notice. But I will say is that this matter has been raised in government in previous budget contexts.

Senator RONALDSON: Not previous—the forthcoming budget context.

Mr Campbell: No. Currently it is being raised in respect of the next budget, but it has also been raised in previous budgets.

Senator RONALDSON: Is there any record of when those discussions took place? **Mr Campbell:** No, that is what I have to take on notice.

<u>Answer</u>

The Minister for Veterans' Affairs has written to the Assistant Treasurer regarding this matter on 28 February 2011 and 28 February 2012.

Question 115

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Letter to Treasurer – DGR Status (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 95)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Senator RONALDSON: In 2006 when the previous coalition government granted DGR status, this was extended out to 18 months I think, was there any offsetting required on that occasion? **Mr Campbell:** I do not know. I would have to take that on notice. I was not here at that time.

Answer

The Department of Veterans' Affairs was not required to offset DGR status within its Portfolio in 2006.

Question 116

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Boer War Memorial (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 96)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Mr Campbell: I think it is probably fair to say that the Boer War memorial and the peacekeepers memorial, because their issues are very similar—they are similar size, they are similar cost, they are both after DGR status—they do often get discussed at the same time.

Senator RONALDSON: When was the DGR status applied for, over and above the seed funding? Mr Campbell: I would have to take that on notice.

Senator RONALDSON: There has been application for DGR status, has there?

Mr Campbell: I think so.

Senator RONALDSON: And a separate application for seed funding?

Mr Campbell: I am 99 per cent certain, but I will take it on notice to confirm that and to confirm when it has been made.

<u>Answer</u>

While there have been a number of representations concerning DGR status, the National Boer War Memorial Association has written formally to the Minister for Veterans' Affairs requesting seed funding in 2007, 2008, 2009 and on 4 November 2010.

Ouestion 117

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Anzac Centenary Advisory Board (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 99)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Senator RONALDSON: I thought you meant the calendar first quarter. That is why I could not quite work out the time. That is fine; thank you. I will move onto the Anzac Centenary Advisory Board. You might want to take these on notice. How many times has the board met? When were those meetings held? Who attended each meeting? Where were they conducted? Between 11 October 2011 and 30 June 2012 and then from 1 July 2012 until today's date, how much was paid to each member of ACAB through daily allowances? To date, what was paid to them for flights? What was the per diem attached to members of ACAB? Were there any other expenses associated with their positions on the board? As I said, I am happy for you to take those on notice. *Major Gen. Campbell: We have quite a bit of that information here, but I suspect that a couple of your last points about particular issues of cost we may not have in front of us.

Senator RONALDSON: Did you have an engineer's report in relation to this, as quoted in the *Adelaide Advertiser* article?

Mr Evans: The engineers' reports that we have are about the construction, fabrication and set-up of stands. The report that we received was from a consultancy skilled in best use of real estate and the safe carrying capacity of a site, and that is what they were charged to provide advice upon. That is the report—

Senator RONALDSON: Can you take on notice who that was, when the contract was and how much it was? I have not got time to go through it today. The *Adelaide Advertiser* article was wrong when it said the 10,000 figure came from engineers who advised that that was the absolute safe capacity of the site?

Mr Evans: The figure came from a consultancy, not engineers.

<u>Answer</u>

Providence Consulting Group Pty Ltd was contracted (CN411925) by the Department of Veterans' Affairs for the provision of a site capacity analysis and risk assessment review at Gallipoli, Turkey. The contract period was 15 July 2011 to 30 September 2011. The contract value was \$55,000.

2000-2006: These numbers are very inexact. They were based on "best guess" methodologies, such as counting the number of people in a small space and then multiplying that number by a number thought to represent the total area of the commemorative site, assuming that all seats in the stands were occupied and extrapolating from the number of Orders of Service distributed.

DVA is now confident that the estimates of 15,000 people in 2004 and 16,500 people in 2005 are significantly overstated. Amongst other reasons, the Lone Pine and Chunuk Bair sites simply couldn't have taken this number between them for the subsequent services. The most that might have been accommodated in these two sites in 2004 and 2005 was approximately 10,000 and there were not 5,000 to 6,500 people left at the Anzac Commemorative Site after the Dawn Service.

2006-2009: In 2006, DVA and VANZ introduced security wrist-banding for members of the public who entered the Anzac Commemorative Site. For 2006-2009, attendance was measured by a wrist-band count for the majority of attendees, supplemented by estimated numbers for some other attendees, for example VIPs, Australian Defence Force members and contract employees such as cleaners.

2010-current: In 2010, DVA and VANZ extended security wrist-banding to all attendees except VIPs. From 2010 attendance has been measured by a wrist-band count, supplemented by a headcount of the people on the VIP buses.

Question 120

Outcome 3: Program 3.2 Topic: Centenary of Anzac (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

At the Anzac Day Dawn Service in Turkey in 2012, how many people attended the Dawn Service, how many seats were provided and how many places were available for people on a 'standing room' basis?

Answer

Approximately 6,000 people attended the Dawn Service on Anzac Day in Turkey in 2012. There were 4,958 seats available in the tiered stands and 280 seats set out in the VIP area. The VIP area had the capacity for another 220 seats and there was space for 3,800 people to lie down in the grassed area overnight. The capacity of the grassed area increases to 5,000 once people stand up for the Dawn Service.

Outcome 3: Program 3.2 Topic: Centenary of ANZAC (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

122 - With regards to the proposed Ballot, is it intended that a 'ticket' to the Dawn Service will also entitle the bearer to commemorative services at Lone Pine and Chunuk Bair?

123 – With regards to the proposed Ballot, will it be possible to apply to only attend commemorative services at Lone Pine and/or Chunck Bair (and not the Dawn Service)?

125 - The Government has indicated that passports and ID will be required to be checked against tickets granted through the ballot at the Dawn Service in 2015. Who will check these documents? Will the Department engage staff locally or from Australia to undertake this work?

128 – Is it still intended that the ballot system will be given a 'dry run' in 2014? If so, when will Australians be able to pre-book their tickets?

Answer

Outcome 3: Program 3.2 Topic: Centenary of Anzac (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

What is the cost of providing security at the Dawn Service in Turkey? What are the expected costs to provide security services in 2015?

Answer

Security at the services on 25 April at Gallipoli (Dawn Service at the Anzac Commemorative Site, Australian Memorial Service at Lone Pine and New Zealand Memorial Service at Chunuk Bair) is provided by Turkey's 2nd Army Corps and Jandarma, at no cost to the Australian and New Zealand Governments. The same arrangements will apply in 2015.

Question 126

Outcome 3: Program 3.2 Topic: Centenary of Anzac (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Has the Department undertaken an audit of the number of motel rooms and accommodation places within close proximity of the Anzac Cove precinct?

- a) If yes, what is the number and where are they located?
- b) If yes, does the Department know what vacancies still exist for Anzac Day in 2015?
- c) If no, to (b) why not?

Answer

There are no motels or tourist accommodation within close proximity to the Anzac Cove precinct, other than the Kum Hotel and Gallipoli Houses, both of which are already fully booked for 2015 by the Department and its contractors. The closest tourist accommodation is in the closest towns of Eceabat and Gelibolu, and at Canakkale on the Asiatic coast of the Dardanelles.

The Department has not undertaken an audit of the number of motel rooms and accommodation places in the general area (Eceabat, Gelibolu and Canakkale), as the information is not especially relevant for managing attendance in 2015. At least 50% of attendees at the Anzac Day services arrive at the Anzac Commemorative Site from Istanbul or elsewhere in Turkey on 24 April and depart the following day, and so do not require local accommodation. The Department expects a significant number of attendees to do the same in 2015.

With regard to attendees who do intend to stay in tourist accommodation, a number of tour operators have indicated to the Department, during the current public consultation, that they have booked accommodation at locations such as Eceabat, Gelibolu and Canakkale and will travel to the commemorative services by coach. Other tour operators will be travelling to the region by cruise ship, and therefore accommodation is already provided. Many tour operators have also advised the Department that where they have made bookings it is to hold accommodation for intended tour packages, and that people will only be allocated to rooms once tour places are actually confirmed. The Department is advised that this is standard practice in the tour industry.

Question 127

Outcome 3: Program 3.2 Topic: Centenary of Anzac (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

- 1. How many tour operators has the Department or the Australian Government accredited to provide tours to Gallipoli in 2015?
- 2. How many places have been pre-sold?

<u>Answer</u>

- 1. Neither the Department nor the Australian Government accredits tour operators to provide tours to Gallipoli in 2015.
- 2. The Department has been advised that as at 30 September 2012 there are some 5,680 bookings with Australian-based tour operators. Of these, only 1,859 appear to have been "pre-sold" in that clients, after paying a deposit in 2010, were required to pay the full tour price by March 2012. The Department understands that these clients have all been advised by the tour operator to take out travel insurance. The Department does not have visibility of the insurance policy or the number of clients who have taken up travel insurance.

The remaining bookings are in the form of fully refundable deposits, or indications of interest to a tour operator.

The Department further understands that the four major UK-based tour operators have not been taking deposits from prospective clients.

The Department is aware of at least four cruise liner packages being offered with a total capacity of 7,396. Bookings for these cruises form a portion of the total figure of 5,680 (including the 1,859 pre-sold places mentioned above). Only one of these cruises is indicating to clients the possibility of attending the Anzac Day services; the other three intend to moor some distance offshore from North Beach and Anzac Cove and take a live feed of the ABC broadcast.

Question 130

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Centenary of Anzac (Written Question on Notice)

Have grants under the Centenary of ANZAC been frozen as per the freeze announced by the Government in the Mid Year Economic and Fiscal Outlook? If yes, what impact will this have on the provision of grants to support the Centenary of ANZAC?

Answer

No.

Question 132

Outcome 3 : Program 3.2 Topic: Centenary of Anzac (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

Given the Phase 2 report by Colmar Brunton is now more than 12 months old, when does the Government expect to publicly release this \$150,000 report?

Answer

The Anzac Centenary Advisory Board is currently preparing wide ranging advice that is expected to be provided to Government in late 2012. The Government will then consider whether or not to release the Report when that advice has been received.

Question 133

Outcome 3: Program 3.2 Topic: Centenary of ANZAC (Written Question on Notice)

Senator RONALDSON asked:

On what terms has the Chair of the ANZAC Centenary Advisory Board been engaged? Can the Department provide a full breakdown of the Chair's remuneration and any travel costs associated with this position?

Answer

The Chair of the Anzac Centenary Advisory Board has been engaged through a letter of agreement which identifies arrangements for remuneration, travel and associated expenses.

For the 2011-12 financial year, the Department paid the Chair \$93,673.60 (GST inclusive) in sitting fees at the agreed rate of \$800 (GST inclusive) per diem plus superannuation. The Department also incurred \$59,769.53 (GST exclusive) in travel expenses to support the Chair.

For the 2012-13 financial year to 30 September 2012, the Department has paid the Chair \$8,272.00 (GST inclusive) in sitting fees at the agreed rate of \$800 (GST inclusive) per diem plus superannuation. The Department also incurred \$16,124.49 (GST exclusive) in travel expenses to support the Chair.

Question 134

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: 2/40th Battalion Memorial (Written Question on Notice)

Senator BUSHBY asked:

- 1. What is the Department doing to assist with the establishment of a memorial in Hobart for the $2/40^{\text{th}}$ Battalion?
- 2. If the Department is not aware of the campaign to establish a memorial for the 2/40th Battalion, what would be the best process for the proponents to follow in order to achieve a timely resolution?

<u>Answer</u>

- 1. Senator Bushby wrote to the Minister for Veterans' Affairs on 22 August 2012 informing the Minister that Mrs Susan Beard, with the assistance of the Hobart City Council, was intending to apply for a grant through the Department of Veterans' Affairs to establish a memorial in Hobart to honour the 2/40th Battalion.
- 2. As of 6 November 2012 the Department of Veterans' Affairs has not received any grant requests regarding a 2/40th Battalion Memorial.

The proponents can apply for the Saluting Their Service (STS) grants which support projects and activities which directly commemorate Australia's servicemen and women who served in wars, conflicts and peace operations to promote appreciation and understanding of the role those who served have played in shaping the nation. Question 135

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Anzac Centenary Advisory Board Members (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p 102)

Senator Ronaldson asked:

Senator RONALDSON: So the only way they can be paid a sitting fee is for a formal government contract? Ms Hale: That is my understanding. Major Gen. Cosson: That is correct. Senator RONALDSON: In every situation where someone is paid a per diem amount it requires a formal contract with the Commonwealth? Major Gen. Cosson: In these circumstances— Senator RONALDSON: What do you mean 'in these circumstances'? Major Gen. Cosson: Because it was not a formal-Ms Hale: Statutory appointment. Major Gen. Cosson: Yes, an established statutory body, we looked into how we could best engage the members of the board. This was considered to be the best mechanism by which to engage them and to be able to pay them the fee to participate in the board meetings. Senator RONALDSON: Did you get legal advice in relation to that? Major Gen. Cosson: Yes, we did, and contracting advice. Senator RONALDSON: Are you happy to provide that legal advice? Major Gen. Cosson: I will check to see if we have got that formally on record.

Answer

Discussions were held with the Department's Legal and Contracts sections regarding the best method to arrange for payments to be made to the Anzac Centenary Advisory Board members. As the Board was not a statutory authority, the issues arising were non-controversial and there were many examples in the public sector of similarly-constructed arrangements, these discussions were not documented into a legal or contracting advice.

The issues considered in making this decision have been outlined below:

- the Anzac Centenary Advisory Board is an administrative body not statute based;
- to comply with the Department's responsibilities under the Financial Management & Accountability Act, there was a need to have a mechanism that provides certainty of the agreed arrangement and value of that payment; and
- it was agreed that the most expeditious method was an exchange of letters.

Question 136

Outcome 3: Program 3.1 Topic: Anzac Centenary Advisory Board members (FADT Hansard Proof 17 October 2012, p102)

Senator Ronaldson asked:

Major Gen. Cosson: No, the estimate of the contract is what we estimate for the full value of this particular member of the board which would cover their sitting fees, which would cover any of the travel, but they do not get paid that \$20,400, that is purely for our budget estimates on what we project we may be paying if they were to sit for those periods with the board and travel interstate for the board meetings.

Senator RONALDSON: That is all clearly identified in the contract, is it? Major Gen. Cosson: That is correct.

Senator RONALDSON: You will provide me with a copy of both contracts. You are talking about 16 meetings over the next four years?

However, either party, at their absolute discretion, may terminate this agreement after the start date by giving notice in writing to the other party. The termination will take effect two weeks after the date of the notice and, apart from DVA being required to pay you the fees and expenses incurred to the termination date, neither party will be liable to compensate the other in any way.

This agreement is for your personal services only and you agree not to subcontract it, or any part of it, to subcontractors. It is expected that, during the course of your engagement and payment by DVA, you will:

- (a) prepare for and attend meetings of the Board;
- (b) contribute to out-of-session work, as required, to achieve Board outcomes or recommendations to the Australian Government; and
- (c) perform duties as per the Terms of Reference at Attachment A.

Subject to all other terms of this agreement, you will receive payment of \$588 (inclusive of GST) as a daily sitting fee for meeting days, in accordance with Remuneration Tribunal Determination 2011/09: *Remuneration and Allowances for Holders of Part-Time Public Office* (at Appendix 1), and all other costs, charges and taxes associated with providing these services. This payment will be provided within 21 days after your attendance at the Board meeting.

Subject to all other terms of this agreement, you will be paid Tier 1 travel allowance, exclusive of GST for accommodation, meals and incidentals in accordance with Remuneration Tribunal Determination 2011/15: *Official Travel by Office Holders* (at Appendix 2). This payment will be provided within 21 days after your attendance at the Board meeting. Please note that any approved international travel will be the equivalent of business class airfares.

DVA has a contract with a travel provider who arranges all air travel on behalf of the department at a discounted rate. Bookings and amendments for your air travel will be facilitated by DVA – you are unable to make changes directly with the airline. DVA will ensure that travel arrangements represent an efficient and cost-effective means and to avoid unnecessary costs, DVA will make every effort to arrange for you to depart on the morning of the scheduled meeting and return to your home destination that evening. However, circumstances will arise where it is necessary to travel the night before and DVA will determine your entitlement to travel allowance in these instances.

If an overnight stay is required to enable your attendance at the Board meeting, you will be responsible for making your own accommodation arrangements.

Subject to all other terms of this agreement, DVA will reimburse reasonable costs associated with surface travel to enable your attendance at the Board meetings. If you elect to drive to the meeting location, DVA may pay a motor vehicle allowance in accordance with Remuneration Tribunal Determination 2011/15: *Official Travel by Office Holders*. Such a payment will be at DVA's discretion, with adherence to the principles of efficient and cost-effective means of travel. DVA will not reimburse surface costs or parking for individuals who reside in the same city as the meeting.

Subject to all other terms of this agreement, DVA will cover taxi costs from home to the closest airport for departure to the meeting location; from the arrival airport to your accommodation (as applicable); from your accommodation to the meeting location and return. DVA will pay a motor vehicle allowance for travel to the airport in exceptional circumstances, conditional on your application for such reimbursement. Receipts provided outside of this timeframe will not be considered for reimbursement.

- 14. Develop a consultation program with the Australian community on the state and local level about planning, programming and to identify potential collaborators and stakeholders for the centenary commemorations.
- 15. Propose a broad and accessible program at the national level of domestic commemorative events and activities that will engage Australians and provide opportunities to mark the significance of the Anzac Centenary.
- 16. Develop an engagement and communication strategy with all levels of the Australian community and assist in delivering that strategy.
- 17. Develop and participate in a visits program to promote and engage Australians in the centenary, including public speaking, media engagements, fundraising and outreach activities.

- 18. Liaise with identified stakeholders in other countries with whom collaborative partnerships may be entered into or where Australian contribution towards identified activities may assist in the development and delivery of an international commemorative program for the centenary.
- 19. Develop and propose to the Minister any legacy initiatives including advice on feasibility, appropriateness and inclusiveness.
- 20. Advise on, and maintain an awareness of current and emerging risks associated with, the proposed initiatives within or for the Anzac Centenary program as a whole.
- 21. The Board will be informed by a range of advisory and stakeholder groups. These groups will provide critical information and advice on key initiatives to the Board on centenary proposals. Members of the Board will chair working groups according to their background, expertise and links to key stakeholders.
- 22. The implementation of the Centenary program proposed by the Board and as agreed by Government will be the responsibility of the Anzac Centenary Section within the Department of Veterans' Affairs, the Interdepartmental Anzac Centenary Taskforce and associated working groups, as well as identified communities, groups, associations and individuals within the broader Australian community.
