Senator BERNARDI—Is there any provision in the contract for the introduction of an ETS and how that might affect electricity pricing?

Mr Nakkan—There has been an estimated forecast. I do not have that information with me but I can obtain it.

Senator BERNARDI—Would you be able to provide that to me, please?

Senator BERNARDI—By way of clarification, Mr Kenny, specifically I am interested in what you are expecting as an increase in electricity costs as a result of the ETS or if any increase has been built in there. I would like to get it before we get to the debate of the emissions trading scheme in the Senate—when ever that will be—hence my request as a courtesy to get it as soon as possible rather than by the fixed questions on notice period of 10 July. So I repeat that to you, Mr Thompson: if it is possible to get it in the next three or four days then it would be most advantageous.

Answer

1 There is no provision in the contract for the introduction of an ETS.

2 Treasury modelling reported via the Department of Climate Change fact sheet (December 2008) predicted a cost of \$23 per tonne of carbon dioxide (CO₂) for energy producers.

Parliament House is responsible for the production of approximately 20,000 tonnes of CO_2 through the consumption of electricity. At \$23/t, this would add around \$460,000 to our electricity costs when based on 2007–08 consumption.
