Question:

- a) In regard to the \$71 million over four years allocated in the Budget to investigate those suspected of engaging in organised welfare fraud, has the Privacy Commissioner been consulted about this program and, if not, why not? What is the view of the Privacy Commissioner?
- b) Is figure of \$127.6 million over four years expected to be recouped? How was this figure calculated?

Answer:

- a) No. The outcomes of this program will be achieved through the better detection and application of the most appropriate risk treatment. The Privacy Commissioner will be consulted where there are any new treatments applied that are not already part of established reporting to that authority.
- b) Yes. The initiative has established investigation targets over the life of the initiative, with the associated policy department having expected administered benefits as shown in the following table.
