Answer:

The National Mental Health Commission was established at 1 January 2012. The terms and conditions of employment of staff including on study currently mirror the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet's (PM&C) Enterprise Agreement 2011-2014 and associated study guidelines:

"The department is committed to maintaining its reputation as a learning organisation, and actively supports learning and development opportunities for employees. Employee needs will be balanced against organisational requirements and availability of opportunities. It is expected that PM&C employees and their managers will identify learning and development needs and opportunities as part of the Performance Management and Development Scheme".
