Overview

This report contains details on each policy commitment assessed by the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, in consultation with the Department of the Treasury and the Department of Finance and Deregulation, as forming part of the Government's platform for the election.

How is the report structured?

Each commitment description includes:

- a summary of the policy
- who in the Government announced the policy and the specific source of the policy announcement
- whether legislation is required
- whether costs were announced with the policy
- whether charter costs have been prepared, and
- an initial assessment of the first steps to implement the Government's policy and a
 preliminary identification of risks and other matters to be addressed.

Individual election commitments are grouped with related commitments under <u>broad policy</u> categories, such as 'Families' or 'Regional Services'.

Within each category the Government's policies are sorted alphabetically.

For your reference, the following table summarises the categories that have been used in the report and groups these under the four themes used in the incoming government brief.

The Record of Election Commitments has been generated as a PDF report and can be accessed in two ways:

- 1. As part of the Incoming Government Brief on the iPad, or
- 2. On the CD disk provided using a PC computer

Using the iPad

The Record of Election Commitments is the final section of the brief and can be accessed from the Overview Page of the Brief.

The data is organised by Policy Category. There is also an index of commitment titles with associated page number.

You can scroll through the document and browse the data, or you can jump to a Category or a single commitment within a Category using the bookmarks option.


- i. Using the Bookmark Option
 - 1. To access the main menu of the GoodReader, tap in the centre of the screen at any point.
 - 2. Then tap on the icon on the bottom-right of the screen and the Bookmarks window will appear with a listing of Category links.
 - 3. Tapping on a category link will take you to that Category, while tapping on the white arrow on the right of the Category will 'drill-down' to the commitment links available for that Category.
 - 4. You can open and select a bookmark link anytime you are in the Brief.



You are able to move around the Record of Election Commitments utilising the links provided in the left-hand window.


To expand and collapse Categories as required:

- 1. Click the + next to the Category to expand the Category and view the Title links for all Commitments under this Category.
- 2. Click the next to the Category to collapse the Category and hide the Title links for all Commitments under this Category.
- 3. At any time, click on either the Category Name or the Commitment Title to view the corresponding page in the right-hand window.
- 4. Clicking on the Category Name will jump to the list of Commitments for that Category.
- 5. Clicking on the Commitment Title will jump to the details of this Commitment.

Browsing Commitments via the Find function

If you know some keywords from a required commitment, but are unsure of the Category it might be under, you can use the Find box to search for a Commitment using keywords.

- 1. In the Toolbar, locate the Search Box, labelled Find: Find
- 2. Type in the keywords you wish to search on, and select Enter.
- 3. The document will automatically jump to the first occurrence of this keyword and highlight it.



4. Click on the Previous and Next icons to view other places where this keyword exists:



The rebate will be on top of existing incentives and will replace the current solar hot water incentive when it ends. It is intended that the rebate will remain in place until 2020. Given their solar energy classification, heat pumps will be eligible under the program. In consultation with the renewable energy sector, the Government will also consider the inclusion of ceramic fuel cells and other new domestic technologies which may emerge.

The Government has also committed to establish a Community Solar Programme as part of the One Million Solar Roofs Initiative.

Details

1. Immediately put on hold the marine bioregional planning process to allow for its restructure.

This commitment includes establishing a Bioregional Advisory Panel for each of the four marine bioregions to advise on potential marine protected areas and the design of management plans and to consult with the community and fishing industry on the restructure of the marine bioregional planning process.

Provide a fair and balanced displaced effort policy.

A Ministerial Panel, jointly chaired by the Ministers responsible for fisheries and the environment, will be established to oversight the design, development and consultation of the displacement policy.

The displacement policy will be developed through the four Bioregional Advisory Panels, in consultation and negotiation with affected commercial and recreational industry representatives (including charter operators and onshore related businesses).

The displacement policy will be informed by socio-economic modelling of the reach of the fishing sector into the community. Consultation on the policy will examine options to reduce the negative economic impacts that would flow from implementation of the draft plan.

As a last resort, if consultation and negotiation does not reduce impacts below levels that are reasonably compensable, then compensation, structural adjustment or other appropriate measures will be delivered before any constraints on fishing are implemented.

3. Base marine protected areas on science.

The Government has committed to requiring peer-reviewed scientific evidence of threats to marine biodiversity to be made available to all stakeholders, including affected communities and industries, before any decision is made on future marine protected areas.

The Government has also committed to working cooperatively with all impacted communities and industries through the Bioregional Advisory Panels to develop socio-economic impact statements for each proposed marine protected area.

4. Establish sensible and balanced marine park boundaries and develop management plan in consultation with industry.

The Government has committed to consulting closely with people and industries that use the marine environment, including the recreational and commercial fishing sectors, to determine marine protected area management plans in accordance with relevant legislation and other regulatory frameworks.

Significant weight will be given to existing and effective fisheries management plans when considering assessed areas. Marine protected

areas management plans will have the central aim of maximising biodiversity protection while also minimising the social and economic impact of the local fishing sector and onshore businesses.

Management plans will be implemented over a reasonable period of time to assist with transitional arrangements.

5. The Ministers responsible for fisheries and the environment will be jointly responsible for approving final boundaries and management plans for marine bioregions.

- create local jobs for local Indigenous people and preserve and protect dugongs and turtles by establishing and equipping Indigenous Rangers to enforce the laws; and
- ensure the prosecution of the illegal and inhumane slaughter of turtles and dugongs and support Traditional Owners to protect and manage their own country.

Funding of \$1 million will be provided to helping clean up marine debris along the Far North Queensland Coast, the Torres Strait Islands and in the Coral Sea.

Additionally, funding of \$1.6 million has been committed for specialised Indigenous Ranger Programs to achieve the conservation and enforcement objectives above.

The first target is to reduce the take of dugongs and turtles by at least 90 per cent, to start the process towards ending the hunting of these species altogether.

A new, more accurate default income arrangement will be introduced that uses a parent's previous taxable income instead of a lower default income in cases where they have not lodged a tax return. It is anticipated this measure will save \$58.8 million over four years through reductions in Family Tax Benefit outlays to the child support recipients.

The policy is only intended to affect participants in the Child Support Scheme who are late or fail to lodge a tax return and their last known income is higher than the default income of two thirds of the male total average weekly earnings (MTAWE) which amounts to \$39,236 in 2010.

Participants whose last known income was lower than the default income will continue to be assessed under the current policy of having their income uplifted to match the two thirds of the MTAWE amount.

The Government has committed to delivering the 2007 ten point national plan for the Murray-Darling Basin, which includes investment in irrigation infrastructure, addressing over-allocation, reforming management of the Basin and establishing a taskforce to examine the potential for land and water development in northern Australia. Details of the Government's commitment to reconstitute the Northern Australia Land and Water Taskforce are included within the related commitment. In regards to the Basin Plan, the Government has committed to releasing the draft Basin Plan (the Guide to the Proposed Basin Plan) for public consultation within two weeks of coming to office. The commitment notes that if this is not possible, the Government will release a public statements of reasons why the Guide is not being released and a timeline for its release at the earliest opportunity. The Government has also committed to the development, finalisation and implementation of the Basin Plan (including the Environmental Watering Plan) in a considered and transparent way and without delay. Additionally, the Government has committed to establishing transparent timelines and expectations for State Government reforms. Details of the Government's commitment in relation to a referral of powers and, as a last resort, a national referendum are included within 'Real action on the Murray-Darling Basin: Commonwealth Management of the Murray-Darling Basin'.

Real Action on the Murray-Darling Basin: Improving inefficient infrastructure

Details

The Government has committed to providing an additional \$300 million funding for on-farm infrastructure, to help maintain the economic base for Basin communities and maintain Australia's food production. Additionally, the Government has committed to finalising plans for the Menindee Lakes re-engineering project within 6 months and commencing the construction of the Menindee Lakes re-engineering program within 12 months. If there are any delays, the Government will publish the reason why and updated timelines. Funding of \$400 million for this project is available under the Sustainable Rural Water Use and Infrastructure Program (SRWUIP). If the project can be completed for less than \$400 million, the remaining funding will be used to assist other New South Wales communities in the Basin with achieving greater water use efficiencies.

The Government has also committed to publicly releasing timelines and targets for the delivery of all state-led State Priority Projects. The Government will ensure project proposals undergo rigorous due diligence processes prior to funding and will consider reallocating funding to other water savings projects if states fail to meet timelines and targets for delivery of projects.

Real Action on the Murray-Darling Basin: Urgent action for the Lower Lakes and Coorong

Details

The Government has committed to instructing the Commonwealth Environmental Water Holder to give priority to its allocations during 2010 -11 to raise the water level in Lake Alexandrina. It is estimated that more than 100GL will be available through this process. The Government has further committed to seeking additional flows through the Living Murray Initiative.
