Answer:

1. For the period 1 July 2010 to 30 June 2011 the department paid 13,083 invoices. Ten per cent of these were paid later than 30 days and 3% were paid later than 60 days.

No interest was paid on overdue accounts.

2. For the period 1 July to 30 September 2011 the department paid 4,557 invoices. Twelve per cent of these were paid greater later than 30 days and 2% of accounts were paid later 60 days.

No interest was paid on overdue accounts.
