## **Question:**

- 1. How much was spent on printing 2011-12? Of this amount, how much was for printing documents?
- 2. How many documents (include the amount of copies) were printed in 2011-12? How many of these printed documents were also published online?
- 3. Of the documents that were printed in 2011-12, where were they delivered and what was the cost?
- 4. How much has been spent on printing this financial year to date? Of this amount, how much was for printing documents?
- 5. How many documents (include the amount of copies) have been printed this financial year to date? How many of these printed documents were also published online?

#### **Answer:**

- 1. In 2011-12 the Department spent \$372,839.27 (GST exclusive) on printing. Of the total, \$90,074.61 (GST exclusive) was spent on printing documents.
- 2. The Department does not maintain records in a way that would readily allow further breakdown of this information. To attempt to provide this level of detail would involve an unreasonable diversion of resources.
- 3. The Department does not record data on delivery of documents in a way which would allow this information to be readily accessible. To attempt to provide this level of detail would involve an unreasonable diversion of resources.

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- 4. For the period 1 July 2012 to 30 September 2012 the Department spent \$140,389.80 (GST exclusive) on printing. Of the total, \$84,093.06 (GST exclusive) was spent on printing documents.
- 5. The Department does not maintain records in a way that would readily allow further breakdown of this information. To attempt to provide this level of detail would involve an unreasonable diversion of resources.
