Senator Ludwig asked the following question at the hearing on 13 February 2007:

For the years 2005-06 and 2006-07 (to date), could the Department please indicate:

- a) how much was recovered under the Proceeds of Crime Act?
 - i) where have these funds been allocated in terms of grants and programs?
 - ii) how much has been allocated in each grant or program?
 - iii) Who is presently responsible for selecting the recipients of this funding?
 - iv) What criteria is presently used to select programs and grants for funding?

The answer to the honourable senator's question is as follows:

a) In 2005-06 \$12,773,886.59 was received into the Confiscated Assets Account under the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002*.

In 2006-07 to date, \$8,796,796.74 has been received into the Confiscated Assets Account under the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002*.

iii) Approval of programs for the expenditure of money standing to the credit of the Confiscated Assets Account under section 298 of the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002* is at the discretion of the Minister for Justice and Customs.

iv) Section 298 (2) of the *Proceeds of Crime Act 2002* provides that expenditure from the Confiscated Assets Account may be approved for one or more of the four following purposes: crime prevention measures, law enforcement measures, measures relating to treatment of drug addiction, or diversionary measures relating to the illegal use of drugs.

Non-Government sector funding is allocated through a targeted grants program. Guidelines for the September 2006 Non-Government Sector funding round, which include selection criteria, are at **Attachment A**. These Guidelines may be adjusted from time-to-time depending on the type of projects being targeted.
