(157) Program 4.1: Visa Compliance and Status Resolution

Senator Cash (L&C 68) asked:

In relation to the 8825 compliance related departures, do you have the cost of that to the government? Provide a break-down of voluntary departure and involuntary departure and assisted departure. Provide a list of the countries to which they have been returned.

Answer:

Cost of compliance related departures:

The individual cost of a removal can vary widely depending on factors such as the destination and commercial airfare costs, whether security or other escorts are required (including their airfares, accommodation and allowances) and the types of immediate post-return assistance that may be appropriate.

During 2009-10 the average cost for removing a person who originally arrived documented at an Australian port was around \$4000. This figure does not include location, detention, case management or review costs.

The cost of IMA removals usually ranges from \$5000 to \$15 000 per person. These figures do not include location, detention, case management or review costs.

IMA removals generally cost more than non-IMA removals because:

- it is policy that people who arrive in Australia irregularly are usually escorted through transit points while being removed to their final destination; and
- the routes to the destination countries for such removals often require multiple transits.

Break-down of departure types

The 8825 compliance-related departures for 2009-10 consist of the following elements:

*Voluntary/Involuntary signifies whether the client signed a request for removal. Some clients who decline to sign a request for removal (and are therefore counted as 'involuntary') may nonetheless wish to depart so are cooperative with other aspects of their removal.

The Department does not have consolidated data for the final destination countries of removees and those departing on BVEs. Often a client will be removed or will return to their country of citizenship. Following are the figures on removals and departures by citizenship:
