Question No. 85

Senator Brandis asked the following question at the hearing on 12 February 2013:

In relation to seizures:

- 1. Every year from 2007/08 to 12/13, what is the exact quantity of drug seizures, cash seizures, seizures of proceeds of crime, seizures of firearms and other weapons that have resulted from ACC initiated operations, i.e. where the ACC were the 'lead' agency in identifying a criminal network and passed their information on to 'partners'?
- 2. Every year from 2007/08 to 12/13 what was the exact amount of confiscated assets that were returned to the Federal Government?

The answer to the honourable senator's question is as follows:

1. The ACC's operating model is to undertake all investigations and operations (defined as ACC projects) in partnership with other agencies. As such, the commencement of any project by the ACC can be the culmination of a number of agencies efforts; describing the ACC as the 'lead' or otherwise for a project is thus incorrect, it is, rather, a collective effort.

Table 1.1 provides a summary of key results that have eventuated as a result of ACC projects. The 'indirect' results are based on results where the ACC can lay some claim to the outcome or assisted in the outcome, but not necessarily being involved throughout the end-to-end process in securing a result. Everything the ACC does is either with or for a partner. As a result, there are instances where the agency has provided assistance to a partner's investigation through use of specialist capabilities, but have not been involved in the whole process.

Note: The ACC reports drug value by Estimated Street Value (ESV) as opposed to quantity. Therefore ESV in dollars is provided as a drug result in Table 1.1).
