Senator Bartlett (L&C 72) asked:

In relation to the subclass 449 humanitarian stay temporary visa holders, (a) provide the end dates and (b) how many times have the visas for the Ambonese been renewed?

Answer:

(a) Eight subclass 449 humanitarian stay temporary visas will cease in August 2004.

Fourteen subclass 449 humanitarian stay temporary visas will cease in September 2005.

(b) The subclass 449 visas held by the Ambonese have been extended on 9 occasions

(82) Output 1.5: Offshore Asylum Seeker Management

Senator Kirk (L&C 76) asked:

At the last Estimates you advised that IOM received \$120 million of the \$170 million spent on the Pacific Solution. Can you update that figure? Has it changed?

Answer:

At the February 2004 Estimates, DIMIA advised that since the introduction of the Pacific Strategy the total payments made to IOM were, to the end of December 2003, about \$122 million. Payments made to IOM to 31 May 2004 were about \$132 Million.

For the period September 2001 through May 2004 the total direct costs of operating the Manus and Nauru OPCs, including IOM costs, was about \$186 million.

(83) Output 1.5: Offshore Asylum Seeker Management

Senator Ludwig asked:

Can you provide the cost of detention per day per detainee on Nauru? Please provide this figure for each month of the 2003-2004 financial year.

Answer:

Per capita costs for asylum seekers accommodated in offshore processing centres are not calculated. This is because offshore processing centres are kept in a state of readiness and, therefore, changes in the number of residents may not necessarily impact on costs. Offshore costs also include capital expenditure. This arrangement differs from the costing structures that apply to onshore detention facilities where occupancy levels are the major determinant of costs.

Senator Kirk (L&C 82) asked:

What is the current process for requiring settlers in the skilled family and humanitarian streams to advise DIMIA of their intended place of residence in Australia?

Answer:

For the General Skilled Migration categories (visa sub-classes 136, 137, 138, 139, 861, 862, 863, 880, 881, 882), the employer sponsored categories (visa sub-classes 119, 120, 121, 855, 856 and 857), and the Distinguished Talent category (visa sub-classes 124 and 858), offshore applicants are required to advise the name of the State/Territory in which they intend to live.

For onshore applicants under the above categories, applicants are required to provide their current residential address in Australia.

For the Business Skills categories (visa sub-classes 127, 128, 129, 130, 131, 132, 160, 161, 162, 163, 164, 165, 840, 841, 842, 843, 844, 845, 846, 890, 891, 892 and 893) applicants sign a declaration that they will advise the Department of their residential addresses in Australia and of any subsequent changes in their residential addresses.

In respect of the Humanitarian Program (visa sub-classes 200, 201, 203 and 204), applicants are not required to provide advice of their intended place of residence in Australia.

Under the Special Humanitarian component of the Humanitarian Program (visa subclass 202), proposed entrants are sponsored by Australian residents who are required to provide their residential address to the Department as part of the application process.
