### Question No. 140

#### Senator Ludwig asked the following question at the hearing on 24 May 2007:

- i) Each Judge is responsible for the management and resolution of the first instance proceedings allocated to his or her docket, and in addition will usually hear and determine a number of appeals each year. The number and duration of hearings and the time required to write judgments in a matter will vary depending on such factors as the complexity of the legal and factual issues, the number of parties, the number of witnesses and the amount of documentary and other evidence.

The Individual Docket System means each Judge is able to allocate his or her time appropriately having regard to the nature of the cases in his or her docket and the Court's time standards in relation to the resolution of 85% of cases within 18 months of filing and the delivery of judgments within 3 months of a decision being reserved.
