LEGISLATION PROPOSED FOR INTRODUCTION IN THE 2005 SPRING SITTINGS

Bills marked * are proposed for introduction and passage in the Spring sittings

AGRICULTURE, FISHERIES AND FORESTRY

Agricultural and Veterinary Chemicals Legislation Amendment (Data Protection) Bill

- complete the implementation of the regime of data protection in respect of agricultural and veterinary chemicals to cover new chemicals, extensions to the use of existing chemicals, and chemicals subject to review

Agriculture, Fisheries and Forestry Legislation Amendment Bill (No. 1)

- bind the Crown to the *Quarantine Act 1908* and amend the *Export Control Act 1982* to include in the definition of 'preparation' the catching of fish, create an offence provision for a person who prepares goods for export that are not prepared in accordance with orders, facilitate the use of automated foreign country certification and clarify the range of services for which fees can be charged

Australian Wine and Brandy Corporation Amendment Bill

- implement the new European Community Australia Wine Agreement, correct problems in the offence provisions and update the *Australian Wine and Brandy Corporation Act 1980* to bring the provisions into line with other legislated changes and with current practice

Murray-Darling Basin Amendment Bill

- provide more flexible financial arrangements for River Murray Water, most importantly, a renewals annuity for the water storage assets it manages; introduce the principle that state contributions to River Murray Water will be in proportion to the service each receives from it

Plant Health Australia (Plant Industries) Funding Amendment Bill

- enable plant pest eradication levies and charges to be appropriated to Plant Health Australia

Primary Industries Levies and Charges Amendment Bill

- better protect government and industry interests in the imposition, collection and disbursement of primary industry levies

ATTORNEY-GENERAL'S

Customs (Extension of import cut-over time) Bill *

- change the last possible time on which import cut-over time can occur under the *Customs Legislation Amendment (Application of International Trade Modernisation and Other Measures) Act 2004*

Law Enforcement Reform Bill *

- provide for the establishment, functions and powers of an Australian Commission for Law Enforcement Integrity, headed by a statutory Integrity Commissioner, as an independent body with special investigative powers to look into possible corruption in Australian Government law enforcement agencies and to recommend remedial measures, including prosecution, to the relevant authorities

Australian Human Rights Commission Legislation Bill

- restructure, refocus and rename the Human Rights and Equal Opportunity Commission

Bankruptcy Legislation Amendment Anti-Avoidance Bill

- implement changes relating to the recovery of the bankrupt's property

Bankruptcy Legislation Amendment (Recovery of Excessive Superannuation Contributions) Bill

- allow a bankruptcy trustee to recover excessive voluntary superannuation contributions made by the bankrupt prior to bankruptcy

Copyright Amendment (Encoded Broadcasts and Criminal Laws) Bill

- extend criminal and civil liability to certain unauthorised activities concerning encoded broadcasts

Copyright Amendment (Indigenous Communal Moral Rights) Bill

- provide moral rights to Indigenous communities in certain copyright works and films

Customs Legislation Amendment (Anti-dumping) Bill

- amend the *Customs Act 1901* to make changes to anti-dumping provisions

Customs Legislation Amendment (Border Compliance and Other Measures) Bill

- amend the *Customs Act 1901* and the *Customs Administration Act 1985* to enhance border controls and national security

Customs Legislation Amendment (Revenue, Licensing and Other Measures) Bill

- amend the *Customs Act 1901* and other related legislation to make changes to revenue, licensing and other provisions

Customs Legislation Amendment (Valuation Provisions) Bill

- redraft the valuations provisions in Part VIII, Division 2 of the *Customs Act 1901* to give effect to the main recommendation of the *Review of the Customs Valuation Legislation*

Customs Tariff Amendment Bill (No. 3)

Jurisdiction of the Federal Magistrates Court Legislation Amendment Bill

- give the Federal Magistrates Court jurisdiction in certain matters

COMMUNICATIONS, INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY AND THE ARTS
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Australian Sports Anti-Doping Authority Bill *

- provide a legislative framework for the Australian Sports Anti-Doping Authority to conduct investigations and present cases at hearings into alleged doping infractions
- subsume the testing, education, investigations and other functions of the Australian Sports Drug Agency

Telstra (Transition to Full Private Ownership) Bill *

- allow for the full sale of Telstra and related measures

Archives Amendment Bill

- update the *Archives Act 1983* in accordance with current practice and assist the National Archives of Australia to promote good record-keeping across the Commonwealth

Australian Postal Corporation Amendment (Quarantine Inspection and Other Measures) Bill

- provide for the opening and inspection of certain postal articles carried by Australia Post for interstate quarantine purposes
- extend the performance standards regulations making power, and enable the Minister to exempt Australia Post from the requirement to prepare service improvement plans

DEFENCE

Defence Legislation Amendment Bill (No. 1)

- amend the *Defence Force Discipline Act 1982* consequential to changes in the criminal law of the Australian Capital Territory
- amend the *Defence Act 1903* to change reference from "investigating officers" to "inquiry officers"
- amend the *Naval Defence Act 1910* to align naval cadet age provisions with those for army and air force cadets
- amend the *Military Superannuation and Benefits Act 1991* to implement recommendations from the *Review of Australian Defence Force Remuneration 2001*

Defence Road Transport Exemption Bill

- amend the *National Transport Commission Act 2003* to clarify the extent of Defence's exemption from State and Territory road transport legislation

EDUCATION, SCIENCE AND TRAINING

Anglo-Australian Telescope Agreement Amendment Bill

- amend the definition of "the Agreement" to incorporate the Supplementary Agreement (a treaty action between the Australian Government and UK Government)

EMPLOYMENT AND WORKPLACE RELATIONS

Employment and Workplace Relations Legislation Amendment (Welfare to Work and Other Measures) Bill *

- implement a range of initiatives that form part of the government's Welfare to Work measures which is aimed at comprehensively rebalancing Australia's welfare system to encourage increased workforce participation for those with the capacity to work, thereby reducing welfare dependence

National Occupational Health and Safety Commission (Consequential Amendments and Transitional Provisions) Bill *

Australian Workplace Safety Standards Bill *

- repeal the *National Occupational Health and Safety Commission Act 1985* and deal with consequential and transitional matters arising from that repeal
- provide for the making of occupational health and safety standards

Workplace Relations Amendment (Reform) Bill *

- implement a program of substantial workplace relations reform including improving the mechanism for setting minimum wages and conditions and simplifying the agreement making process

Independent Contractors Bill

- protect the status of independent contractors and minimise unnecessary regulatory constraints placed on them by workplace relations laws

- provide a range of measures to be included in a number of environment and heritage areas

Renewable Energy (Electricity) Legislation Amendment Bill

- amend the *Renewable Energy (Electricity) Act 2000* to clarify renewable energy sources, increase opportunities for solar and bioenergy technologies, enhance market transparency and improve overall efficiency of the Act

FAMILY AND COMMUNITY SERVICES

Family and Community Services Legislation Amendment (Welfare to Work) Bill *

- increase from 20 to 24 hours of care per week the limit on child care benefit eligibility for non-work related purposes

"Last month, police say they smashed a highly-organised smuggling ring importing cocaine through Sydney airport which used the help of baggage handlers. According to court documents lodged by the NSW Crime Commission, that syndicate alone is alleged to have imported 200 kilograms in six months. Unfortunately for law enforcement, by the time it was discovered, the cocaine had already hit the streets. A statement of facts tendered to Central Local Court claims it was sold for \$30 million. Police believe one of the key players in the syndicate is 58-year-old Michael Hurley. Former and serving detectives have told The Sunday Telegraph they believe him to be one of the country's most successful drug importers. And he's allegedly done it with cunning and the help of a handful of corrupt police. Police sources say he was so well connected that he twice got access to a Federal police radio. The first time was in the 1980s, the second was in the early 1990s. According to police, he and another major importer then hired a friend to listen to the police radio day and night. With the radio, Hurley was able to eavesdrop on police operations and evade detection. "That's the way Hurley works, he works on the early-warning system," said one former detective. Hurley, born and raised in Pyrmont, is now on the run. In a career spanning four decades, police say Hurley is suspected of smuggling hashish, heroin, ecstasy, and, more recently, the cocaine that is now flooding the city. One court hearing in 2001 was told the ex-wharfie had \$50 million in overseas bank accounts. Despite that, he's never been to jail for a drug offence. Much of the cocaine allegedly imported by Hurley's syndicate found its way into nightclubs, or A-list restaurants frequented by older professionals. Investigators have little doubt he skipped the country after a tip-off from someone in law enforcement."

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"The Sunday Telegraph has been told the NSW Crime Commission is blaming a Federal police officer, a 30-year veteran who has been suspended. The officer's colleagues have sprung to his defence, believing the leak came from the commission, a secretive body set up to fight organised crime. They name one commission employee who knew Hurley well and fear the AFP officer could become an unfortunate scapegoat." If that happens, there'll be a queue of former and serving coppers 15 miles long who will testify to (the officer's) integrity," said one source. "Mick Keelty (the AFP Commissioner) needs to take a balanced view."



I ASKED THEM TO HELP MY SON. NOW HE FACES A DEATH SENTENCE

Police face Bali nine legal battle

The father of the accused Bali drug courier Scott Rush told Australian Federal Police the teenager was going to Indonesia to commit drug offences but they reneged on a promise to stop him, court documents reveal.

Lee Rush says the police's refusal to warn his son has exposed the Brisbane 19-year-old to the death penalty under Indonesia's tough anti-drug laws.

The sensational accusation comes only days before Scott Rush and several other members of an alleged nine-member smuggling syndicate face drug trafficking trials next week.

Indonesian police want all nine of the Australians to be executed by firing squad.

Mr Rush revealed in an application filed in the Federal Court yesterday that on or about the same day that his son travelled to Bali last April he asked the police for help to stop him leaving Australia.

He said his state of mind at the time was that his son was "going to Indonesia in respect of drug-related matters" and he in-

structed a lawyer to ask the federal police to intervene.

Mr Rush said police officers subsequently told him through the lawyer Robert Meyers that Scott would be informed that he was "under surveillance and being monitored thereby dissuading him from committing any offence in Indonesia that might render him liable to the death penalty in Indonesia".

But Mr Rush said that "contrary to the assurances" the officers did not contact or inform Scott, who was arrested at Bali International Airport on April 17, allegedly with heroin strapped to his body.

Scott Rush and another of the accused couriers, Renae Lawrence, 27, of Newcastle, are taking action in the Federal Court sitting in Darwin over what they claim is the denial of procedural fairness over their arrests in Bali and the legality of the conduct by federal police under Australian law.

They say the police acted illegally when they provided assistance to the Indonesian police that led to the arrests, "exposing them to the prospect of the imposition of the death penalty".

The application they lodged

seeks records, notes and documents relating to their arrests.

The application, due to be heard on Monday, will intensify criticism of the police handling of the arrests.

John North, president of the Law Council of Australia, yesterday called for police guidelines to be dismantled and changed to conform with the Federal Government's position not to assist in death penalty cases.

Civil liberties advocates have attacked the police for tipping off Indonesian police about the alleged activities of the nine in Bali - exposing them to the death penalty - instead of waiting for them to arrive back in Australia with heroin.

But Mr Rush now reveals he gave the federal police information about his son's intentions before Scott and other members of the group even left Australia.

The police commissioner, Mick Keelty, said after the arrests that his officers would provide evidence that could assist Indonesian police impose the death penalty because the nine were "caught red-handed".

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Police face legal fight over Bali accused

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But the Attorney-General, Philip Ruddock, said on September 28 that Australia would no longer co-operate in cases "unless there is an assurance that a death penalty will not be sought".

Indonesian authorities responded by saying they did not need any help with the prosecutions and it was not important under Indonesian law for any Australian police to give evidence.

The Justice Minister, Chris Ellison, defended the federal police yesterday, saying they had "acted properly throughout".

"I reject any allegation that the AFP breached any guidelines; I've seen the work they've done," he said.

Senator Ellison said that until charges were laid, police-to-police assistance remained within guidelines covering the way the police handle cases involving Australians overseas.

But he said that once charges had been laid, any request for help from Indonesia had to be made under the two countries' Mutual Assistance Treaty. This required the death penalty being taken off the table.

Mr North, the law society president, said it was difficult to say what impact the application could have on the trials in Bali.

"The Indonesians will go ahead under their own system based on the evidence they have gathered against the nine Australians," he said.

"But they might take some notice if it is fact that the co-operation [with the Federal Police] was not in accordance with proper guidelines."
