Senator Hurley asked:

According to DIMIA's Annual Report 2003-2004, p.122, members of the Council for Multicultural Australia (CMA) contributed on one occasion to the resolution of local community relations tensions.

- which local communities were involved in this conflict;
- what was their problem;
- how was it resolved by the Council for Multicultural Australia (CMA).

Answer:

- 1. Members of the Samoan and Indigenous communities in the Brisbane suburb of Acacia Ridge.
- 2. The problem arose after an Indigenous child playing in the street was disciplined by some Samoan residents. The resulting tensions escalated into a violent melee.
- 3. The issue was resolved, in part, through a series of meetings between local Indigenous spokespersons, police representatives and CMA members, Associate Professor Boni Robertson and Mick Van Heythuysen. Professor Robertson also arranged a meeting between the then Minister for Citizenship and Multicultural Affairs, the Hon. Gary Hardgrave MP, and Indigenous elders.
