Senator Nettle asked:

(1) How many of the asylum seekers in Indonesia have relatives in Australia?

(2) How many asylum seekers in Indonesia are under the care of IOM and being paid for by Australia?

(3) How many people were 'pushed back' from Australia during Operation Relex?

Answer:

- (1) We are aware of about 60 persons in the care of either IOM or UNHCR in Indonesia who have relatives living in Australia and have made an application for a visa to Australia. As at 30 November 2005, twenty-seven of these persons had been granted visas and were awaiting travel.
- (2) At 30 November 2005, 305 people were in the care of IOM in Indonesia.
- (3) According to the report of the Senate Select Committee on a Certain Maritime Incident, there were 502 prospective illegal immigrants aboard the four suspected illegal entry vessels that were redirected under Operation Relex.
