Senator Boyce asked the following question at the hearing on 18 November 2013:

Senator BOYCE: I have questions around the number of bankrupts who apply to travel overseas. Ms Ingram, do you have numbers on that? Are you able to give me figures or quantify and qualify?

Ms Ingram: I can take the question on notice, but I understand it is roughly five per cent, and that is cumulative. Obviously you are talking about new bankrupts in a year, and then you have current bankrupts who may be in their second or third year of bankruptcy.

Mr McCosker: Over the last few financial years—we [do] not have the exact figures with us but we can provide those on notice—it is between five and eight per cent of the total number of active administrations that we have on foot at any given time.

Senator BOYCE: It would be good if you could provide that information on notice.

Senator BOYCE: What percentage of applications to travel do you approve and how many are refused? **Ms Ingram:** I would have to take that on notice, but I would say about 99 per cent, probably, would be approved—the vast majority.

The answer to the honourable senator's question is as follows:

The table below provides details on the number of travel requests received and processed during the financial years 2009-10 to 2012-13 against the number of debtors under the control of the Official Trustee.
