#### 1. GENERAL STATEMENT OF PROGRESS AGAINST PROJECT OBJECTIVES

#### The project objective:

• To deliver animal welfare improvements at the point of slaughter for Australian livestock in Indonesia.

The project has delivered animal welfare improvements at the point of slaughter through:

- Reviewing new locations that are processing Australian animals and installing infrastructure that improves animal welfare outcomes at the point of slaughter. The review of facilities is on track with 43 sites covering 78 restraining boxes inspected (71% of total restraining box sites). While there have been no Mk1 boxes installed, a detailed review and assessment of the nominated sites has been undertaken. The first Mk4 box has been installed with 3 additional sites prioritised for installation.
- Assessing existing locations processing Australian animals and conducting a repairs and maintenance program to ensure they are operational and deliver appropriate animal welfare outcomes. A detailed Repairs and Maintenance (R&M) program has been developed covering 29 sites and will be delivered from February.
- Delivery of training in Standard Operation Procedures (SOP) for slaughtermen to ensure that animals are processed in a humane way. 172 slaughtermen have been trained in SOPs covering 13 locations and 20 restraining boxes. A detailed SOP training program has been developed to ensure the highest priority sites receive SOPs by 15<sup>th</sup> June 2011.

#### The Program Objectives:

- Enabling better animal welfare outcomes in the handling, transport and processing of live animals in importing countries.
- Supporting importing countries to adopt and implement World Organisations for Animal Health (OIE) animal welfare standards.

This project will deliver improved animal welfare outcomes through ensuring that Australian animals are processed at suitable abattoirs with appropriate infrastructure and with correctly trained slaughter staff.

This project supports importing countries to adopt and implement World Organisation for Animal Health (OIE) animal welfare standards through installation of infrastructure that assists local slaughtermen to correctly handle and process Australian animals and trains slaughter men in the correct procedures for processing cattle that meet OIE standards.

The Livestock Export Program (LEP) has consulted with importers and local feedlot operators through the APFINDO animal welfare taskforce. This taskforce has identified 42 locations for review. The LEP has also held several discussions with the Animal Welfare branch of DGLS and received a list of locations from the government for review.

The LEP conducted a desk top review of the locations provided by the APFINDO taskforce to determine a priority list. A priority list of 7 facilities was identified following this initial review. Many of the facilities on the APFINDO list are currently not processing Australian animals due to the shortage of Australian cattle in the market. There are also a number of locations on the list that have a copy box in place. These facilities will remain on the review list for further monitoring if export volumes increase and they start to receive Australian cattle. The LEP has been conducting a cross check of the list provided by the DGLS and the known locations with restraining boxes to determine additional sites for review. This process is still being conducted.

In addition to the list provided by APFINDO taskforce, a further 8 sites have been inspected where there are already Mark 1 or copy boxes and consideration is being made for the need of an additional box.

A program is being developed to relocate boxes from closed sites.
