What is the purpose of the Australian government's \$1 million contribution to the Treaty benefit sharing fund?

Answer:

Australia's Contribution to the Benefit Sharing Fund

In June 2010, Australia contributed \$1 million (US\$870,000) to the benefit sharing fund. The benefits to Treaty members include facilitated access to plant genetic resources for agricultural and food production; sharing of research and development; eligibility to share the benefits arising from the use of genetic resources under the Treaty system; and eligibility for financial support. Australian farmers benefit from the Treaty as over 95 per cent of Australian agriculture uses plant genetic resources from other countries.

List of projects funded under the Benefit-sharing Fund within the first project cycle (2009-10)

The following projects preserve varieties of food and agricultural products that might otherwise be lost. Preserving these varieties maintains their availability for all treaty members, including Australia, for future use.

The Funding Agreement with Ninti One Ltd includes indicative numbers for camel removal through combined Australian and State/Territory government, commercial and Indigenous activities. The Funding Agreement also provides for these indicative figures to be revised through Annual Works Plans in response to current circumstances, including:

- consent for activities on Indigenous lands
- market conditions
- availability of shooters and helicopters
- climatic conditions.

The 2009-10 Annual Works Plan target was 15,000 camels.

The 2010-11 Annual Works Plan target is 143,000 camels.

For both 2011-12 and 2012-13, the indicative removal number is 230,000 camels per year.
