Senator O'Brien asked:

Senator O'Brien - I am told that the International Maritime Organisation's Convention on Facilitation of International Maritime Traffic contains a provision that says governments will not require visiting seafarers to hold visas. Are you aware of that?

Mr Kilner – I might pass to Mr Sutton to answer that.

Mr Sutton – I am not aware of that particular provision. We will certainly take that on notice.

Answer:

The Convention on Facilitation of International Maritime Traffic 1965 (the FAL Convention), as amended, contemplates the issue of visas to crew members, for example at sections 2.17 and 3.3.7 in the Annex to the convention. Section 3.45 in the Annex to the convention provides that crew members shall not be required to hold a visa for the purposes of shore leave.

Article VIII(1) of the FAL Convention provides that where a contracting Government finds it impracticable to comply with any Standard, or deems it necessary for special reasons to adopt formalities, documentary requirements or procedures differing from that Standard, then it should inform the Secretary-General of the International Maritime Organization of the differences between its own practice and the relevant Standard. The Migration Amendment (Maritime Crew) Bill currently before Parliament would create a new maritime crew visa. As indicated in the explanatory memorandum to the Bill, the change is intended to allow an appropriate level of security checking before the granting of a visa, which is not possible under current arrangements. This measure is a necessary enhancement to general maritime security. Once the measures come into operation, the Government will be notifying the International Maritime Organization of the particulars of the changes, as required by the Convention. Question: MLT 02
