That was an amount of \$23,000 for two dinners at that workshop, which was scheduled for 10 and 11 October 2012. Question on notice no. 174 now tells us that it was incorrectly classified as official hospitality. What is it now classified as and where would we find it in the budget? Dr O'Connell: Mr Schaeffer is just getting that.  Mr Schaeffer: For 2011-12, our official hospitality spend was \$900,681.  Senator COLBECK: How did that line up against the budget? It is in regard to the terms of reference for a review of inspection regimes prior to the export of livestock from the Fremantle port. I understand it was undertaken following a recommendation of the Farmer review. Could you give us a brief overview of what was the background that caused Mr Farmer to make that recommendation?  Dr Schipp: During the preparation of the Farmer report, Mr Farmer visited Fremantle during preparation of sheep for live export and saw there a number of sheep that were not suitable for export and he was concerned at the number of those animals and so made a recommendation in his report that we look again at the inspection arrangements at Fremantle and compare those to the inspection arrangements at other ports.  Senator BACK: Do you know how many vessels Mr Farmer and/or his group oversaw in forming that recommendation?  Mr Schipp: One.  Senator BACK: Perhaps you could give us some indication as to what the vessel was and when, if you would.  Mr Schipp: Yes.	15

Ms Mellor: So by failures, Senator, you mean where it has not met the protocols?  Senator BACK: Yes, that is correct. I suppose that is a way to put it. Although hemp snuck up on us, Senator Colbeck.  Ms Mellor: Do you have any more details, Senator Colbeck, of the time and place?  Senator COLBECK: I am trying to find out how you actually found the hemp in the grain that came in.  Ms Mellor: Perhaps we could take that one on notice, just to keep things moving.  CHAIR: Yes I think we might have to; hopefully, that can come back to us before the half-hour is up.  Ms Mellor: We will see what we can get. 22	Agricultural Productivity Division/ APVMA	Di Natale	Sale of antibiotics for veterinary use	Dr Bryce: The APVMA has taken on the job of collecting information on the sales of antibiotics for veterinary use. This is a different question, though, than the question you are asking about surveillance of antimicrobial resistance.  Senator DI NATALE: So you do not play any role in collecting and analysing the results of testing for residues or, for example, the emergence of antimicrobial resistance amongst bacteria and so on?  Dr Bryce: That is correct.  Senator DI NATALE: Who does that?  Mr Koval: Dr Bryce mentioned that there was a survey done in 2003-04, I think. I am not aware of a survey done since then, but I am happy to take that on notice and have a look at that. In terms of testing the residues of products, we do that through our residue survey which looks at antibiotics. I am not quite sure, and I will have to go and talk to the development people in our food division or our animal biosecurity division, about whether or not that then is looked at from the point of view of resistance. As Dr Bennet-Jenkins mentioned, it is a whole-of-government thing and is done across portfolios and, when a new antibiotic is considered for use in animals, the Department of Health and Ageing look at it. They do an antimicrobial risk assessment. The Department of Health and Ageing are very, very conscious of the impact on human health and in their advice to APVMA I am sure that that is considered. But I will have to take that on notice for you in terms of how detailed our analysis is within the department.  Senator DI NATALE: Okay, I look forward to that. 				example, off-label use where a drug is prescribed in a way that is outside the guidelines for that substance. For example, I understand that in veterinary practice it is not illegal to prescribe a drug that might be registered for one class of animals—cattle—for another class, such as other food-producing animals—pigs, sheep et cetera. Is that correct?	
23	Food	Di Natale	Testing of aquaculture	Senator DI NATALE: Because it is an emerging area, I am interested in the issue of testing in locally farmed seafood. In particular, what sort of testing is done for unlicensed antimicrobials? What sort of testing regimes apply?  Mrs Bennet-Jenkins: In terms of testing, it is not the APVMA's role to conduct testing in aquaculture.  Senator DI NATALE: So who does that?  Mrs Bennet-Jenkins: It would be part of the testing that is done either by the department here or the states and territories.  Senator DI NATALE: I am particularly interested in this area because aquaculture is one of those emerging areas where there is a lot of off-label use of antimicrobials. There are concerns around the potential for antimicrobial resistance, of course, in aquaculture. I would like to know a little bit more about the testing regime. How is that done? Do we test for residues in fish? Do we test for resistant bacteria?  Mr Tucker: We can probably take that on notice. Aquaculture is by and far carried out in state waters so the Commonwealth does not have a direct responsibility over those areas of activity, but we can take that on notice and see what we can find out for you.  Senator DI NATALE: Again, there would not be a clear national picture emerging from this area, would that be fair to say?  Mr Tucker: Not to my knowledge, but we can confirm that.	51 15/10/2012

Senator COLBECK: I want to go to clause 3B.5 which says:  The Agency's obligations to provide the Final Technical Report in relation to a Work Order allows for three working days after the day on which the Work Order is due to be finalised and dispatched by the Agency to the APVMA.  To me that is saying, 'We set a date when we want the stuff done, but you can give it to us three days after that if you like.' Am I interpreting that correctly?  Mr Matthew: I am sorry, I do not actually have a copy of the SLAs with me. I will have to take on notice how that provision is being interpreted. Senator COLBECK: In how many of those markets, while there might be orders that apply, are they actually in use or being utilised?
