Collaboration between SA Department of Human Services and Commonwealth Department of Health and Ageing The ATA is a pilot program for older people who have been in hospital and are expected to benefit from rehabilitation & support. The service provides short term rehabilitation and support services either in a person's own home or temporarily in a residential aged care facility. The ATA aims to provide planned services to achieve the best possible level of function, and a resumption of the lifestyle and accommodation of choice.

- At discharge from the ATA, over 60% of people went home (24% with additional community services, 21% with their existing community support, and 15% with no additional support). 20% were readmitted to hospital (of whom two thirds returned to the Program). Fewer than 17% of people were discharged to residential aged care.
- 778 referrals have been received since the Program began, and an average of 36 referrals per month were made in 2003.
- 488 older people were admitted to the program, which is about 65% of all referrals
- 30% of people were admitted within 4 days of the initial referral, while over 60% were admitted within 7 days of the initial referral
- An average of 48 older people receive services at any one time
- Less than half of all people served received services in a residential care setting and a bit more than half received services in their own home.
- Clients admitted to the program had spent an average of 35 days in hospital prior to admission, with 8% having been in hospital for more than 65 days
- Most of those people previously approved for high or low level residential care showed an improvement in their level of functioning as a result of the Program. (HLC: 70%) (LLC: 82%)
- Over 63% of people were discharged at a lower RCS level.
- Clients spent an average of 54 days on the ATA/HRSS program.
- The average age of clients admitted was 83 years, with 36% aged more than 84 years, and 5% aged less than 65 years. 64% of all clients were female.
- Over 76% of clients referred, received only one or no services *prior* to admission to hospital, and that service was usually only equipment.
- 12.7% of all clients were from a culturally and linguistically diverse background including 32% Italian and 15% Polish.
- Of the people not accepted to the program: 20% were discharged from hospital to another option, 14% were deemed to be medically unstable following assessment, for 15% a residential placement was not available in the preferred region, 12% needed permanent residential care with no rehab potential, 11% were deemed not able to benefit from the rehabilitation and 15% needed only community supports.

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
