RE: COMMONWEALTH STATE/TERRITORY DISABILITY AGREEMENT (CSTDA) HEARING - GLENELG, FRIDAY 6 OCTOBER 2006

Following on from my appearance at the above Hearing, Senator McLucas asked me to provide further information on access to Equipment Programs in States other than South Australia.

Whilst this was not an easy task, the Programs within each State varying considerably and managed by different Departments, the overall outcome is that people who are blind or vision impaired are either not provided for at all or have limited access.

The following summarises the information obtained:

Tasmania

Persons under the age of 26 undertaking education are covered Royal Guide the Association of Tasmania and the Department of Education, the latter funded by the Department of Disability for persons aged 18-26 by the Supporting covered Individual Pathways Program.

(The Victorian Aids and Equipment Program does not include the provision of Adaptive Technology equipment for persons with a vision

impairment).

Lotterywest Disability (The Equipment Grant program managed by the Independent Living Centre provides grants up to \$5,000 for Adaptive Technology equipment. The program is means with people becoming ineligible when individual income exceeds \$37,000 or family income exceeds \$62,000).

Based on the information obtained, it is apparent that the needs of people who are blind or vision impaired are not being fully catered for, particularly in the provision of Adaptive Technology equipment, and therefore there exists a significant area of unmet need under the current CSTDA.

I therefore encourage the Committee to recommend that the provision of Adaptive Technology Equipment for blind and vision impaired persons be included in the next CSTDA.

The inclusion of this provision will go a long way towards enabling those who are blind or vision impaired to participate in every day activities and live a life of quality. It will also ensure that equity of access and opportunity is afforded to persons with a vision impairment.
