The introduction by Senator Stott-Despoja of the Transparent Advertising and Notification of Pregnancy Counselling Services Bill 2005 is a subtle, deceptive attempt to undermine the vital and indispensable services provided to women and their babies by Pregnancy Counselling Centres(PCCs).

Senator Stott-Despoja, a committed pro-abortionist, has no concern for the welfare of unborn children who have equal rights in any pregnancy counselling.
