Dear Senator,

Senate Standing Committee on Community Affairs Inquiry into Health Legislation Amendment (Midwives and Nurse Practitioners) Bill 2009 and two

related bills

I am a Birth Educator, Doula, Yoga Instructor and mother of 4 (soon to be five) (with a BA). I see 30-40 pregnant women each week through prenatal yoga classes and I constantly hear that they feel their choices are not adequate. Even though many of them have not chosen homebirth for themselves

(often through fear and misinformation) they are unanimously appalled that

homebirth will be illegal next year and that our politicians are dictating

women's decisions regarding where and how they give birth.

The women's birth stories that I hear are all too often traumatic due to the

overuse of intervention and abuse of power over a woman when she is in the

vulnerable position of labour.

Women choose homebirth because it is a safe and viable option with experienced midwives who have a different set of skills to the medicalised

model of birth. Evidence shows that homebirths have the same outcomes as hospital births regarding maternity & foetal deaths but these figures are achieved with LESS intervention resulting in a more positive experience for

mother and baby. This also achieves a healthier mental, physical and emotional state for both mother and baby.

My first baby was born at the RHW Randwick Birth Centre and was straight forward. My second was caesarean (due to placenta previa) and the following

two at home. I chose homebirh because I knew my chances of a successful VBAC (Vaginal Birth after Caesarean) in hospital was much lower than at home

as all the monitoring and fear is a double edged sword. Each intervention,

interference, disturbance increases the likely hood of a larger more complicated intervention. This is proven and accepted by all sides of the

profession.

When the hormones of labour are studied we can see that a woman needs to feel SAFE, WARM and UNDISTURBED for her body to birth efficiently. This is

why many women choose homebirth and THE CRIME WILL BE HAVING HOMEBIRTH TAKEN

AWAY FORM THOSE WHO CHOOSE IT.

of mother and baby in normal birth. We will be at risk of losing the knowledge that these mothers, fathers and midwives have if we no longer allow this practice. We will completely lose the experience of the many, many benefits of the natural birth.

Homebirth is also important for a Sustainable Health System. Our hospitals

are already overburdened. The amount of resources and expenses required for

a natural birth in hospital far exceeds those of a homebirth. KEEP THE HOSPITAL BEDS FOR THOSE IN NEED. A pregnant woman is not sick. Birth is not an illness. Private midwives are extremely competent and experienced in

birth as well dealing with the unexpected outcomes. They are highly skilled

professionals.

I would not feel safe to birth in hospital. It should be a time for joy - not trauma - and this is fundamentally why I choose homebirth for the safe

delivery of my babies.

I am concerned that there is not a private midwife on your board Advisory Board. This surely means that the practice is not understood. The Obstetricians who support the denial of homebirth to women obviously have no

understanding or knowledge of it. I could confidently assume they have never

attended a homebirth. Most obstetricians have never witnessed a natural birth from the onset of labour to the delivery of the placenta. They are not experts in this area. They are experts in surgery, not in natural birth

process. Independent midwives are experts in the natural birth process. So, please ask them about their practice.

I am concerned at the Health Legislation Amendment (Midwives and Nurse Practitioners) Bill 2009, the Midwives Professional Indemnity (Commonwealth

Contribution) Scheme Bill 2009 and the Midwives Professional Indemnity (Runoff Cover Support Payment) Bill 2009, which are currently the subject of

an Inquiry by the Committee on Community Affairs.

The bills expand the role of midwives in the provision of maternity services, but exclude midwives who attend births at home. By excluding these

midwives, the Government is effectively making attended homebirth illegal.

This is because, under the proposed National Registration and Accreditation

Scheme, due to be implemented in July 2010, any midwife who cannot obtain insurance cannot be registered. Laws in many states make it a criminal act

for an unregistered midwife to attend a birth, and the National Registration

and Accreditation Scheme also imposes a fine for doing so.

If enacted, rules made under the bills before the Parliament will make it illegal for a qualified midwife to attend a homebirth in Australia. Such a

move is dangerous for mothers and babies, bucks international trends in maternity care, and is inconsistent with the Government 1 s stated policy of

providing pregnant women with greater choice and less interventionist maternity care.

With extremely high intervention rates in hospital, many women are afraid to

birth in hospitals and believe their only chance at natural childbirth is at

home. If it becomes illegal for registered, highly skilled midwives to care

for these women, many will feel they have no option other than to birth unattended. This legislation unintentionally promotes this practice, which

is directly contrary to the World Health Organization's objective of having

a skilled attendant at every birth. I am extremely concerned that the legislation will result in unnecessary deaths of babies and mothers, and may

also result in midwives being fined and jailed if they assist labouring women. This is an absurd situation in a modern democracy.

In the UK, New Zealand, Canada and The Netherlands, homebirth is publicly funded and supported. I am not aware of another country in the world where a

midwife can be jailed for attending a homebirth.

Australian women must all be entitled to the same Medicare support wherever

they give birth, and midwives must all be entitled to obtain professional indemnity insurance wherever they work.
