The remaining states and territories, Qld, Tas and the ACT, do not have formal policies or guidelines on homebirths. Victoria has commenced a pilot project, and both WA and Vic are considering adopting the SA model for their jurisdictions.

The Australian College of Midwives (ACM) has developed the *National Midwifery Guidelines for Consultation and Referral* to assist midwives in consulting or referring women for advice or further care from medical or midwifery colleagues.
