It is for me 1st a place for ex-Residents
and people like myself where we can talk,
we can share, our sorrows, and have people
who went through the same kind of life and
pain and hardship of suffering, and a real
understanding of where we came from.

For me, it was feeling so much better
by going to the Esther Centre, firstly. I
did not talk much, I was frightened
to talk out in case I made a fool of
myself, and I thought I was not smart.
enough to answer questions.

I was so nice, and self-conscious
and had a very low self-esteem - about myself.
because my education really was grade 3 at 12 yrs
old - than in one year I jumped 3 classes
and was in grade 6 - but I didn't learn
anything than - I knew nothing than - But by
going to Esther Centre now, I feel alive, -

I feel I am learning to conquer, I am
more self-confident, I now dare to speak
I learn - Courses, I'm getting the education
I need - I am waking up, about nice and
negativity - I'm learning Computer - oh so much.

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So much I have achieved since ten years ago when I first went and started to go to Ester.

I love the place, and people, they ARE patient and good and do understand us. I have now such a better quality of life, which I didn't have before. I am amazed of my own intelligence of my efforts and who we do our Brain -

Storming - there I got up some times and spoke

We now have a Voice - We ARE - Now Starting to get Recognition and people are

Starting to see us and want to know more about us - We are also trying to educate the politicians and the public and trying to make them aware of our abuse in care.

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Going to Ester Centre has given me, more confidence in myself, and not so much negative anymore, it has given me the ability, to trust people again, the courses, has shown me, many things I never knew. It has woken up my

intellectual state of mind, to assure me, that all my thinking, are the choices we choose. If it was not for the Ester Centre - I would not feel or have any quality of life, nor would I be confident in myself, I wouldn't trust people as much as I do, and being active in all, the workshops - being involved and being occupied, has helped me. 300% to what I was then. 10 yrs ago.

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Thank you - We now have a voice we are now being recognised. Thank you ESTER for opportunity - and we celebrate ^{Centre} 10 yrs on.

To overcome adversity, and helping others do the same. The Reasons why I got and became on board with Ban, because "here was a (place) who open up the doors for us" for people who did and had experienced abuse in church and state institutions. After some time we, we started telling and writing our stories, and found it to be very similar to everyone's else story - so we a group of people decided to lobby the Govt, with the help of H.A.N. CEO : Karyn Welsh, who Gladly offered her services to help us, though it was to be a long lengthy journey which took a lot off time energy, and Lobby of the Govt, state and local Government to Request a possibility of a Remember day, and Remembrance state to be hold in honour, of those children who did not survive the experience of abuse, Our dream was of a public memorial space, that would be a reminder to the general public, of the experience of children in Institutional care. It cost a lot of time and funding and new relationship with local and state Government dept, at that time Anna Blij was Minister for ~~Government~~, and ~~for~~, Karyn; through the lobbying, from pre-SOICA, and HAN. ex-Resident and hard work of Karyn Welsh. When Anna Blij the Ministers of Communities along with Peter Battle together with Blq. state & local Govt S.O.I.C.A. Survivors of institutional Child Abuse. (~~androgenous~~)

Govt, had appointed Ms Leanne Ford to be Commissioner of the ~~Forde~~ Inquiry into Abuse in institutions and after the findings of Response to ~~Leanne~~ Ford's Inquiry "through, Healing and HORROR" in 2000 involving 125 former ex-Resident.. which the Book was based on the findings of Abuse, then we had a poetry BOOK so we also put out about, memories —

We are working along with.. the Govt, and ex Residents and we are giving a voice as to what we need for future. To develop and receive education opportunities Regs to fully develop Socially, live well, healthy, protected from all forms of abuse and neglect.

Drama "Memoirs of the forgotten one" Stories ex-residents
I joined the HAN, to learn to be able
to increase my understand of the needs
of ex-Residents and about my self, to
get educated, life changing Results, but I
have to do it and participate my self in
these opportunity's. and learn more skills
in literacy, reading, and doing drama, -
which I took on in 30/31-3-2007.

In 1999, the Forde Inquiry filed a Report officially detailing the extent of abuse and neglect that Queensland children experienced whilst in state care from 1935.

"The Moving On" project facilitates the use of drama and counselling with adult survivors of this abuse. Participants have taken part in drama, games, and exercises to build skills and share their stories. For "Memoirs" each participant has chosen a significant story from their life for development into a final performance.

This performance marks the end of the three and a half year project that has been funded by the Australian Research Council and undertaken in Partnership between Griffith University and Relationships Australia's Aftercare Resource Centre.
