I'm glad you are having an enquiry into climate change policy. Climate change is the biggest challenge facing both Australia and world in our present time. It is a bigger challenge than the current economic downturn and in fact the economic downturn presents us with a great opportunity to change the way we live and spend our money both as individuals and as a society.
