Submission for the inquiry into the premature sexualisation of children

Dear Inquiry,

I am concerned specifically with one aspect covered by this inquiry, that is the sexual objectification of women and its effect on girls and young children. I believe we have regressed to a point where everything that the women's rights movement fought so hard for has been wasted. I am 35 years old and when I was growing up I was constantly being taught messages of equality - by society and other women.
