ANTI-SIPHONING
COVERAGE OF LISTED EVENTS MAY 2004

OVERVIEW

ASTRA has monitored all free-to-air coverage of anti-siphoning listed events in May 2004. ASTRA plans to provide regular monitoring to determine exactly which listed events and how many listed events are actually broadcast on free-to-air television in Australia.

Analysis from May has revealed:

- **Just 10% of all the events protected under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast by the free-to-air networks.**
- **The free-to-air networks broadcast less than half (47%) of all events to be protected under the revised list which will operate from 2006 to 2010.**

EXAMPLES

- Free-to-air coverage of the French Open in 2004 is limited to a mere 2 x half hour highlights packages each day of the tournament on the ABC. Limited live free-to-air coverage of French Open in the past 5 years is evidence that free-to-air networks are not interested in broadcasting this event live. Despite this lack of interest the event remains on the anti-siphoning list until 2010.
- Game 1 of the Rugby League State of Origin series was broadcast live in Sydney and Brisbane only. GTV in Melbourne, NWS in Adelaide and STW in Perth all delayed coverage of the State of Origin until 11pm, choosing instead to broadcast Extreme Makeover - an American imported program about plastic surgery. Regional viewers outside of NSW & QLD were also denied live coverage of the game.
- NRL round games receive no live coverage on free-to-air television in Australia and no prime time coverage outside NSW and QLD. Channel Nine broadcasts 2 games on delay of a possible 7 games in each round of the Premiership.
- AFL receives limited live match coverage. Only 28% of all Premiership AFL games in May were broadcast live and only 5 out of 8 games are broadcast at all each round, yet every match of the Premiership remains on the anti-siphoning list until 2010.
- Channel Ten failed to broadcast any Formula 1 or Moto GP race live in May 2004.
- None of the 3 One Day International matches Australia played in Zimbabwe in May received any live coverage on free-to-air television in Australia. This follows the continuing trend whereby Australian cricket matches played overseas receive extremely limited free-to-air coverage in Australia.

ANTI-SIPHONING
COVERAGE OF LISTED EVENTS JUNE 2004

OVERVIEW

ASTRA has continued the ongoing monitoring of all free-to-air coverage of anti-siphoning listed events in June. ASTRA will provide regular monitoring to determine exactly which listed events and how many listed events are actually broadcast on free-to-air television in Australia.

Analysis from June has revealed:

- **Just 10% of all the events protected under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast by the free-to-air networks (same level of coverage as in May 2004).**
- **Free-to-air networks broadcast only 11% of events to be protected under the revised list, due to come into operation from January 2006.**

EXAMPLES

- Channel Nine delayed coverage of Wimbledon in favour of regular scheduling. On June 27, Australians were denied the chance to see Mark Phillipoussis' Round 3 match v Fernando Gonzalez LIVE as Channel Nine did not begin their tennis coverage until the Sunday Night movie had concluded at 23:30. All other matches broadcast on this night were in turn shown on delay. Throughout tournament, Channel Nine broadcast only 5% of all protected events. Despite this low level of coverage, every game of the Championships will remain on the anti-siphoning list until 2010.
- Free-to-air coverage of the French Open in 2004 was limited to a mere 2 x half hour highlights packages each day of the tournament on the ABC. Limited live free-to-air coverage of French Open in the past 5 years is evidence that free-to-air networks are not interested in broadcasting this event live. Despite this lack of interest the event remains on the anti-siphoning list until 2010.
- Game 2 of the Rugby League State of Origin series was broadcast live in Sydney and Brisbane only. As with the 1st game of the series, GTV in Melbourne, NWS in Adelaide and STW in Perth all delayed coverage of the State of Origin until 11pm, choosing instead to broadcast Extreme Makeover and a replay of CSI Miami.
- The Australian Netball team's 1st game of a 3 match test series against the World Champions New Zealand was broadcast by the ABC on delay only.
- No Moto GP race in June was broadcast live on Channel 10.

ANTI-SIPHONING
COVERAGE OF LISTED EVENTS July 2004

OVERVIEW

ASTRA has continued the ongoing monitoring of all free-to-air coverage of anti-siphoning listed events in July. ASTRA provides this regular monitoring to determine exactly which and how many listed events are actually broadcast on free-to-air television in Australia.

Throughout July there have been several high profile examples where the free-to-air networks have denied Australians access to live sport coverage in favour of regular programming. ASTRA's analysis from July reveals that these examples are not isolated:

- **Just 40% of all the events protected under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast by the free-to-air networks in July 2004.**
- **Free-to-air networks broadcast an even lesser percentage (35%) of events to be protected under the revised list, due to come into operation from January 2006.**

EXAMPLES

- **CRICKET:** Channel Nine regularly abandoned its live coverage of play from the 2 test matches between Australia and Sri Lanka in Darwin and Cairns. This programming decision meant Australian cricket fans were denied live coverage of Shane Warne's record-equalling 527th wicket when instead Channel Nine chose to broadcast *The Price is Right*.
- **GOLF:** The final round of the British Open was broadcast on a 2 hour delay in Perth. In other states, Channel Nine did not cross to live coverage of the final round until after 12:30am, despite having the rights to do so as early as 10:30pm. Instead, golf fans were treated with a repeat of an old Clint Eastwood movie *The Enforcer*.
- **NETBALL:** The Australian Netball team's 2nd and 3rd matches out of a 3 match test series v New Zealand was broadcast by the ABC on delay only. No match of the series was broadcast live on free-to-air television in Australia. Despite the ongoing lack of live free-to-air coverage of Netball Internationals, all matches involving the Australian Netball team will remain on the revised anti-siphoning list until the end of 2010.
- **STATE of ORIGIN:** The 3rd and final game of this year's State of Origin series was broadcast live in Sydney and Brisbane only. As with the 1st two games of the series, GTV in Melbourne, NWS in Adelaide and STW in Perth all provided delayed coverage of the State of Origin decider.
- **MOTO GP and Formula 1:** No race in either series was broadcast live by Channel 10 in July.

ANTI-SIPHONING
COVERAGE OF LISTED EVENTS August 2004

OVERVIEW

ASTRA has continued the ongoing monitoring of all free-to-air coverage of anti-siphoning listed events in August. ASTRA provides this regular monitoring to determine exactly which and how many listed events are actually broadcast on free-to-air television in Australia.

Analysis from August reveals:

- **Just 27% of all the events protected under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast by the free-to-air networks in August 2004.**
- **Free-to-air networks broadcast less than half (49%) of events to be protected under the revised list, due to come into operation from January 2006.**

EXAMPLES

- **AFL:** AFL received limited live match coverage on Free-to-air Networks in the final rounds of this year's regular season. Only 34% of all Premiership AFL games in August were broadcast live in Sydney and a maximum of 5 out of 8 games were broadcast at all each round, yet every match of the Premiership will remain on the anti-siphoning list until 2010.
- **RUGBY LEAGUE:** No regular season NRL match was broadcast live in 2004. In August (and throughout the whole season) only 2 games each week were broadcast on delay in Sydney and Brisbane. NRL receives no prime time coverage in other markets; delayed broadcasts are restricted to late night / early morning. Despite this limited coverage, every match of every round will remain on the Anti-siphoning list until 2010.
- **TENNIS:** Despite broadcasting nearly 6 hours of coverage from the first 2 days of the US Open, Channel 9 broadcast only 10% of the total number of available matches, a mere 7% of all protected matches were broadcast live.
- **MOTORSPORTS:** Channel Ten broadcast the 2 Formula 1 Grands Prix in August from Hungary and Belgium on delay only. Round 10 of the Moto GP from the Czech Republic was also broadcast on delay.
- **OLYMPICS:** More than 3,000 different events contributed to more than 2,000 available broadcast hours from the 2004 Olympic Games. At future Olympics, every one of these events and hours will be protected by anti-siphoning legislation under revisions made to the anti-siphoning list due to come into operation from January 2006. Despite Channel Seven and SBS broadcasting more than 615 hours of Olympics coverage and dedicating the vast majority of their schedule to Olympic events, their combined coverage represented less than 30% of all hours that will be protected at future Olympics.

**ANTI-SIPHONING
COVERAGE OF LISTED EVENTS SEPTEMBER 2004**

OVERVIEW

ASTRA has continued the ongoing monitoring of all free-to-air coverage of anti-siphoning listed events in September. ASTRA provides this regular monitoring to determine exactly which and how many listed events are actually broadcast on free-to-air television in Australia.

Analysis from September reveals:

- **16% of all the events protected under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast by the free-to-air networks in September 2004.**
- **More than one third of all events to be protected under revised legislation, due to come into operation from January 2006 were not broadcast live by free-to-air networks in September 2004.**

EXAMPLES

- **AFL:** Although Channel Ten broadcast every match of the 2004 AFL Finals series, live coverage was broadcast inequitably across the country. The following table highlights the differences and shows that AFL fans in Sydney received less live coverage than viewers in other capital cities.

- **RUGBY LEAGUE:** No regular season NRL match was broadcast live in 2004. Of an available 7 games per round, only 2 were broadcast each week on delay. This means that of the 182 games throughout the regular season, only 52 games received any free-to-air coverage (on delay).

In Sydney and Brisbane, Channel Nine broadcast each game of the finals live but similarly to the AFL, not all capital cities received this same level of coverage. Viewers outside of Sydney and Brisbane were denied the opportunity to watch a number of live finals. In Melbourne, viewers received delayed coverage only of their local team, the Melbourne Storm, playing the Brisbane Broncos in the first week of the finals. In Western Australia and South Australia no NRL finals matches were broadcast live, games instead were broadcast on delay, predominantly in early morning or late night time slots.

- **TENNIS:** While Channel 9 broadcast more than 65 hours of coverage from days 3 – 14 of the US Open, this was only 11% of the total number of available matches; while 9% of all protected matches were broadcast live. Under the revised list, each match of the Men's and Women's Singles Quarter Finals, Semi Finals and Finals will continue to be protected - 87% of these matches were broadcast live by Channel Nine in 2004.
- **MOTORSPORTS:** No race of the 4 Motorsport events (2 rounds of the Formula 1 and 2 rounds of the Moto GP) caught under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast live on Free-to-air television in September.

ANTI-SIPHONING
COVERAGE OF LISTED EVENTS OCTOBER 2004

OVERVIEW

ASTRA has continued the ongoing monitoring of all free-to-air coverage of anti-siphoning listed events in October. ASTRA provides this regular monitoring to determine exactly which and how many listed events are actually broadcast on free-to-air television in Australia.

Analysis from last month reveals that in October free-to-air networks broadcast a higher % of listed events than any other month since ASTRA began this monitoring process.

- **80% of all the events protected under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast by the free-to-air networks in October 2004, 53% of these events were broadcast live.**
- **100% of events to be protected under revised legislation were broadcast live by free-to-air networks in some (but not all) markets in October 2004 (see below).**
- **Since ASTRA began monitoring free-to-air coverage of anti-siphoning listed events in May, free-to-air networks have broadcast 16% of all protected events.**

Please note that analysis is based on coverage in Sydney (Australia's largest market). Free-to-air coverage of listed events is inequitable across the country; with the % of coverage varying significantly depending on the market analysis is based eg. Although free-to-air networks broadcast 100% of revised listed events live in October in Sydney, only 43% of events were broadcast live in Perth.

EXAMPLES

- **RUGBY LEAGUE:** Channel Nine broadcast the NRL Grand Final live in Sydney, Brisbane and Melbourne. Viewers in Adelaide and Perth received delayed coverage only. In these 2 markets, viewers have been denied live coverage of every game of the 2004 NRL season as well as the 3 matches of the State of Origin Series.
- **CRICKET:** None of the 3 Tests played by the Australian cricket team in India in October were broadcast live by any free-to-air network. This follows the continuing trend whereby Test series and One Day Internationals played by the national Australian team overseas, receive no Free-to-air coverage in Australia (previous Ashes series and the cricket World Cup are the only exceptions).
- **MOTORSPORTS:** In October Channel Ten broadcast the Australian Moto GP, the Bathurst 1000, the Australian Indycar Grand Prix and the Brazilian Formula 1 Live across Australia. The Japanese Grand Prix and the remaining 3 other Moto GP's in October (Qatar, Malaysia and Valencia) were broadcast on delay only.

ANTI-SIPHONING
COVERAGE OF LISTED EVENTS NOVEMBER 2004

OVERVIEW

ASTRA has continued the ongoing monitoring of all free-to-air coverage of anti-siphoning listed events in November. ASTRA provides this regular monitoring to determine exactly which and how many listed events are actually broadcast on free-to-air television in Australia.

In November a total of only 16 different events were protected by anti-siphoning legislation. In other months, throughout the football seasons and during tennis Grand Slams, up to 600 different events are protected in a single month. Analysis from both October and November shows that with less events protected, the % of coverage on free-to-air television increases significantly.

Analysis from last month reveals:

- **94% of all the events protected under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast by the free-to-air networks in November 2004.**
- **100% of events to be protected under revised legislation were broadcast by free-to-air networks.**

EXAMPLES

- **CRICKET:** None of the 4 tests of the Australian cricket team's tour to India was broadcast by any free-to-air channel. This follows the continuing trend whereby Test series and One Day Internationals played by the national Australian team overseas, receive no free-to-air coverage in Australia (past Ashes series and the cricket World Cup are the only exceptions).

**ANTI-SIPHONING
COVERAGE OF LISTED EVENTS DECEMBER 2004**

OVERVIEW

Throughout 2004 ASTRA has provided monthly monitoring of all free-to-air coverage of anti-siphoning listed events. This monitoring aims to determine exactly which and how many listed events are actually broadcast on free-to-air television in Australia.

In December fewer events were protected by anti-siphoning legislation than average per month in 2004. During the Rugby League and AFL seasons and in months with Grand Slam tennis tournaments the number of events listed under anti-siphoning legislation can reach up to 800. In December only 7 different events were protected. Analysis since October shows that in months with fewer events protected, the % of coverage on free-to-air television increases significantly.

Analysis from December reveals:

- 100% of all the events protected under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast by the free-to-air networks in November 2004.
- 100% of events to be protected under revised legislation were broadcast by free-to-air networks.

Since ASTRA began this monitoring process in May, Analysis reveals:

- 15.3% of all the events protected under current anti-siphoning legislation were broadcast by the free-to-air networks.
- 22.7% of all the events to be protected under revised legislation were broadcast by free-to-air networks.

Following is a month by month breakdown of the number events protected and broadcast by free-to-air networks under both current and revised legislation.
