## GROWING THE GAME

To maximise female participation in Australian football.

## Measurable Outcome 1

Participation pathway for female participants from AFL Auskick to senior women's competitions is developed.

## Associated Initiatives

Utilise AFL Auskick as the key introductory program for young girls.

- Develop youth girls competitions
- Ensure the viability of senior women's competitions
- Links youth and school based programs to exist clubs
- Establish linkages between each level of the participation pathway to encourage transition.


## Measurable Outcome 2

Women's and girls football is an integral component of the community football structure.

## Associated Initiatives

Integrate female football with existing community football infrastructure to encourage growth
E Encourage clubs to consider fielding female teams in their existing club structure

## Measurable Outcome 3

Increase participation opportunities for female students in both primary and secondary schools.

## Associated Initiatives

Develop and enhance school-based female football competitions

- Introduced female students to the game via modified games eg: AFL Recreational Football
- Provide professional development opportunities to female teachers
- Utilise the AFL Sport Education model to introduce female students to the game.


## QUALITY ENVIRONMENT AND CULTURE

 Develop quality, safe and inclusive female environments
## Measurable Outcome 1

Increase club accessibility for participants

## Associated Initiatives

- Provide support for the establishment of new clubs/teams.
- Create and maintain a directory of female clubs and team's link to the national website.


## Measurable Outcome 2

Create quality league and club environments

## Associated Initiatives

Ensure all state leagues sign an affiliation agreement with their state bodies. Affiliation agreements to be clearly defined for both parties

- Identify and implement quality club environment criteria.
- Implement best practice eg: quality club award and club management program.
- Standardise the rules, regulations and by-laws across Australia and ensure communication channels between leagues.


## Measurable Outcome 3

Improved coaching and umpiring programs

## Associated Initiatives

Provide umpire training programs that engage and encourage female participation.

- Conduct female only coach education courses.
- Develop specific orientation course/material for coaching female footballers.


## OPPORTUNITIES FOR TALENTED ATHLETES

To capture and develop talented female footballers, including first choice talent.

## Measurable Outcome 1

Provide opportunities for talented female participants at all levels

## Associated Initiatives

Once participation pathway is developed look to provide opportunities for talent youth participants.

- Reduce the barrier of cost to ensure that the most talented footballers in each state participate
- Promote the opportunity that exists for female participants to represent their state and Territory
- Explore international opportunities (GAA)


## Measurable Outcome 2

Conduct National Championships in a professional manner using best available facilities with a focus on individual development and the opportunity to display talent.

## Associated initiatives

Ensure championship match arrangements and regulations are strictly adhered to.

- Identify best facilities available in host state

Engage state football body to assist with the management of the championship.

- Players to sign code of conduct prior to participating in the championship


## MARKETING AND PROMOTION

To promote awareness and drive participation in female football programs and activities.
Measurable Outcome 1
Women's and girls football to be presented in a positive light

## Associated Initiatives

- Promote female football as a quality sporting alternative to the traditional female sports.
- Utilise AFL events to promote female football e.g. Women’s / Mother Day Round
- Development of National promotional material for female football.
- Development of a communications and PR plan for female football

- Develop profile of one female player in each state to be the face of women's football.


## Measurable Outcome 2

Develop the female football section of the AFL website to disseminate information.

## Associated Initiatives

- Collate contact, competition and general interest information for female football in each state to be included on the AFL website.
- Update information and news articles on the AFL Website on a weekly basis.
- Ensure AFL website links to State specific female football sites.
