DEAR SIR,

TO ESTABLISH A FAIR TAXATION SYSTEM, THE GOVERNMENT (FEDERAL) SHOULD GO FOR A COMPLETE GST. (CONSUMER TAX). ALL OTHER TAXES, LEVIES & DUTIES SHOULD BE SCRUBBED. THIS CONSUMER TAX SHOULD BE COLLECTED & SUBMITTED BY EVERY REGISTERED BUSINESS IN AUSTRALIA FOR ALL GOODS & SERVICES SUPPLIED, WITH NO EXEMPTIONS.

ALL PEOPLE ON FIXED INCOMES, PENSIONERS UNEMPLOYED ETC WOULD HAVE TO BE GIVEN A SUITABLE INCREASE TO COVER THE GST COST. THIS WOULD MEAN A MASSIVE INCREASE IN GOVERNMENT PAYOUTS FOR THE FIRST QUARTER, BUT THINK OF THE CASH FLOW AT THE END OF THE QUARTER PROBABLY 95% OF ALL PENSIONERS ETC WOULD SPEND 95% OF THEIR INCOME WHICH THE GOVERNMENT WOULD COLLECT THE FULL DEDUCTED % GST ON. MASSIVE!

FAIR GATE STORES WOULD HAVE TO BE MONITORED AND A CEILING SET BEFORE GST WOULD HAVE TO BE SUBMITTED IF THE FAIR GATE STORE WAS NOT A REGISTERED BUSINESS. MARKETS & GARAGE STORES WOULD HAVE TO COME IN THE SAME CATEGORY.

All monies raised by this system would
then have to be allocated to respective state governments
to cover their losses in revenue from state taxes & duties
now no longer levied.

No doubt there would be a lot of fine
tuning to be done, but that should not present a problem
with the expert economists & computing equipment available.

The beauty of a system of this nature is
that if the federal government was not getting the revenue
required, it only has to increase the one tax by a
fraction of a percent not point to make up any shortfall.
