Inquiry into the provisions of the Customs Amendment (2007 Harmonized System Changes) Bill 2006; and, the Customs Tariff Amendment (2007 Harmonized System Changes) Bill 2006

On 14 September 2006, the Senate referred the provisions of the above bills to the Senate Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade for inquiry and report by Monday, 9 October 2006.

The bills propose to enable the Executive Officer of Customs to revoke approximately 700 Tariff Concession Orders (TCOs) and replace them with about 1200 new TCOs. They also amend various classifications of goods. The committee is particularly interested in examining any unintended consequences of the proposed changes.
