**Senator FEENEY asked:**

Could you provide an overview of China's activities in building infrastructure in the region and perhaps any information about the performance of the infrastructure China has built and its suitability or otherwise in the judgement of the Australian government for the target countries where it was built?

**Answer:**

The Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Local Government (the Department) is charged with a domestic focus in relation to matters such as the planning, construction and operation of transport infrastructure. The Department does not maintain data on Chinese investment outside Australia and is not able to assist the Committee in this regard.

The Department's enquiries of other Australian Government agencies indicate that they too do not collect this information.

**Senator FORSHAW asked:**

Have there been approaches made by airlines or by the Cook Islands or Fiji to substantially alter the current services?

**Answer:**

Yes, Pacific Blue has been in discussion with the Department about expanding air services arrangements with both the Cook Islands and Fiji. The Department is currently preparing for possible air services consultations with Fijian officials and with the Cook Islands in the first quarter of 2009. Fijian carrier, Air Pacific, recently commenced two services per week between Nadi and the Gold Coast.

**Senator TROOD asked:**

Do you have any statistics on the potential growth for passenger and freight air services for the region? What is the trend in relation to that? Can you provide any statistics on freight traffic?

**Answer:**

This Department does not have and cannot locate from other sources, any forecasts for air traffic in the Southwest Pacific. Most international bodies that produce forecasts incorporate all the fast growing economies of the Asia Pacific region do not identify down to the Southwest Pacific region.

The Department has collected a history of passenger and freight volumes on services between Australia and the member countries of the southwest Pacific (Attachment A). It should be noted that the data does not include flights between the member countries, eg between PNG and Fiji, only between Australia and PNG and between Australia and Fiji.

Attachment B shows all international air services to the region as at October 2008. This may be useful to the Committee as it shows the extent of air services to countries other than Australia.

The Department also notes that AusAID published a report in 2004 for the Pacific Islands Forum which considers some of the difficulties of establishing freight services in the region. The Report is available online at:

**Senator BISHOP asked:**

Do you have any programs or projects at the moment to upgrade existing technology? Is there any idea of the sorts of funds you are thinking about?

**Answer:**

The Department administers a number of programs with a common purpose of capacity development amongst the recipient countries

- The Indonesia Transport Safety Assistance Package (ITSAP) is providing \$24 million over three years for capacity building projects between Australian transport safety agencies and counterparts in Indonesia
- Australia provides limited funding and in-kind assistance to the Pacific Aviation Safety Office (PASO) to enable the 12 members of the Pacific Island Forum to efficiently purchase services to meet international regulatory requirements. PASO's work program does not include the provision of technology upgrades for aviation safety infrastructure
- The Strongim Gavman Program (SGP) contributes to the development of in-country capacity to deliver transport policy, safety and security outcomes in Papua New Guinea (PNG). This Department places officials in advisory roles in counterpart PNG agencies to build long-term capacity in accordance with the PNG Government's own priorities

Funds from any of these three activities are generally not eligible for infrastructure investment or to purchase capital equipment.

Through ITSAP, Indonesia and Australia are jointly investigating the business case to adopt ADS-B technology.

As an indication of the cost of air traffic management technology, Airservices Australia has advised that the cost of equipment purchase, installation and associated training - based on its current project of installing 28 ADS-B ground stations across Australia - is \$14.3 million. This amount does not include the costs associated with equipping all impacted aircraft with airborne ADS-B avionics, which would be required to employ ADS-B as an effective surveillance tool for air traffic control. Costs of equipment and ongoing operation and maintenance costs could also be expected to vary considerably between countries.

**Senator TROOD asked:**

How has the [increasing capacity of government regulation of the shipping industry] affected the costs of shipping at all?

**Answer:**

The Department does not collect information or commission research to measure the costs to the shipping industry of regulatory compliance with Australian maritime law. The Department does not have the capacity to estimate industry costs of regulatory compliance with the regulatory framework of any of the member states of the Pacific Islands Forum.

In 2004 the Department completed a Regulatory Impact Statement for the Australian maritime industry in preparation for new maritime security legislation to be considered by the Australian Parliament.

The Regulatory Impact Statement submitted to the Parliament stated that the initial cost of complying with the new requirements in the Bill would be around \$13 million and ongoing costs were estimated at around \$6 million per year. The Regulatory Impact Statement considered a limited part of the Australian maritime industry; the 70 registered trading ships eligible to be engaged in international or inter-state coastal trading and that would be classified as regulated Australian ships under the Bill.

It is possible that private authorities such as Lloyds Shipping may have data on broader regulatory costs for shipping industry activity in the southwest Pacific.
