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SUBMISSION RE PLEBISCITE FOR AN AUSTRALIAN REPUBLIC BILL 2008

I wish to register my objection to the holding of a Plebiscite for an Australian Republic to be held at the time of the next general election.

My reasons are as follows:

- 1. The holding of a national plebiscite on such an important constitutional question is misleading because it is non-binding and cannot effect an amendment to the Constitution of Australia.
- 2. The proposed question to be put, 'Do you support Australia becoming a republic?' is simplistic because it does not state what kind of republic is being proposed.
- 3. A simple 'yes' or 'no' answer to the general question has no merit because only a referendum in which the nature of the proposed amendment is spelt out can result in an informed decision being made by voters to change the Constitution.
- 4. The national plebiscite has no more standing than a public opinion poll.
- 5. The cost of the national plebiscite estimated to be around \$10 million is therefore a waste of public money that should not be borne by the taxpayers of Australia.
- 6. Since the defeat of the republic proposal in the 1999 referendum, public opinion polls have registered no surge of support for a republic which appears to be an issue of little importance or priority to Australians.
- 7. Senator Brown wants to spend public money on a partisan cause in the hope of breathing life into what appears to be a moribund movement.
- 8. Supporters of a republic should be encouraged to raise and spend their own money on promotion of their cause and not expect a handout from the Commonwealth Parliament.
- 9. Given the global financial crisis and the expected recession that Australia will undergo in the next several years, the Government would be imprudent to spend millions of dollars on a non-binding plebiscite and could expect to be criticized for doing so.
- 10. The Government needs to spend money to stimulate the Australian economy not the republican movement.
