I appreciate that the arguments for and against the FTA have been gone into

by other submissions, so I will not go into too many specifics.

I would however like to say that I do NOT support the FTA as it stands.

The USA is renouned for hurting its FTA partners to further its own economic

growth. Indeed Canada's scarce Natural Gas supplies must now be shared with

the USA under NAFTA, which is severely hurting canadian consumers and industry. The USA foresaw that its own production slide would hurt its own

economic growth, and slipped in a provision that it'd need a few years later

while nobody was watching.

I'm sure that similar provisions would one day severely hurt Australian consumers and industry, and I don't believe that Australia has (or indeed

had) the nous to identify and negotiate out of such provisions in the  $\mbox{\sc FTA}$  as

it stands.

In peering (free transfer of data between Internet Service Providers), you

generally stick to your equals when it comes to free trade (albeit of data).

In my opinion, Australia should do the same, and stick to negotiating free

trade deals with its economic equals.
