## PREVENTING THE JAILED GENERATION

## AUSTRALIAN GREENS SENATOR BOB BROWN

1. I support the report of the committee.

On the basis of the compelling evidence before the committee, I further recommend that:

- 2. The Commonwealth legislate against all mandatory sentencing for adults.<sup>1</sup>
- 3. The Commonwealth act upon the alarming evidence that Australia is now causing a 'jailed generation' of Indigenous people. Particular attention should be had to:
  - the causes of, and remedies for, jailing of Aborigines, with particular reference to cultural disintegration, loss of land, and poor education, health and social services
  - the disproportionate (up to 60:1 in Western Australia under mandatory sentencing) rates of Aboriginal people compared to non-Aboriginal people
  - the detriment of jailing to Aboriginal individuals and therefore to society at large
  - the impact of language-deprivation on Aborigines in their communities, schools, courts and jails
  - the failure of Australia to implement recommendations from previous inquiries including the Royal Commission into Black Deaths in Custody
  - the option of granting Indigenous self-government and customary law (as in Canada)
  - any related matters.
