Submission to Senate Committee on a Republic

Australia's Head of State and the Constitution Booklet - and the intention of the Attorney-General to publish an unsupported statement

Re: Term of reference (a)
Before discussing an "Australian Head of State" I say we already have one. Further, I ask the Committee to comment on the following:

The Constitutional Policy Unit of the Attorney-General's Dept., Mr. Gim Del-Dillar, advised an enquirer on 16 June 2003 that a new Edition of the booklet on the Constitution - 1 July 2003 Edition - was in final stages of preparation but has not yet been 'proofed'. At this stage it will include the phrase "Australia's Head of State is Queen Elizabeth II" THIS IS INSUPPORTABLE BY ANY OFFICIAL DOCUMENT AND IS THEREFORE INACCURATE. (The Governor-General is Australia's Head of State).

- (1) The Constitution does not say the Queen is Australia's Head of State
- (2) The Queen's own web site does not say so. It says she is The Sovereign.
- (3) The Royal Style and Titles Act 1953 does not say so.
- (4) The Federal Attorney-General's Dept. including its Constitutional Policy Unit, despite many requests, is unable to provide any official reference or document which describes the Queen as Head of State of Australia.

## Whereas:

- 1. The Prime Minister does not describe the Queen as Head of State. He refers to the Governor-General as our "effective Head of State".
- 2. Sir David Smith, Official Secretary to 5 Governors-General, unarguably an authority on the subject, has established beyond doubt that the Governor-General is Australia's Head of State. Many agree that the Governor-General is Australia's Head of State and I quote a few: Sir Harry Gibbs; The United Nations; Mr. Douglas Sturkey - former Official Secretary of the Governor-General; The Commonwealth Government Directory August 1992 - 1996, copy attached; Mr. Malcolm Turnbull (p82 'The Reluctant Republic') Blackwell's Encyclopaedia of Political Institutions by Vernon Bogdanor; 'Governing Australia' a book on our Constitution by Atkins & Graycar; The Crimes Act 1976; Republican Mr. Paul Kelly, author and journalist (his book 'the Dismissal' p19); Mr. Peter Beattie (republican); Sir Zelman Cowan (republican); ABC Executive Producer of the '7.30 Report' and Kerry O'Brien; Mr. John Laws; The Australian Newspaper (republican); Mr. Greg Barns (republican); Senator Stott Despoja (republican); Prof. Patrick Lane. To prevent misinformation being included in the new "Overview" to the Constitution would the Committee please request Attorney-General Williams NOT to so describe the Queen unless he can provide documentary evidence to support it.

In many letters he has used the non-legal, non-constitutional and non-effective phrase "It is not "proper" or not "appropriate" so to refer to her." The words "proper" and "appropriate" are Constitutionally meaningless and in no way a justification for anything of this nature.
