Submission on the Anti -Terrorism Bill (No. 2) 2005

- a.. A number of legal experts have stated that existing laws give police and ASIO sufficient powers to deal with any terrorist threats that arise.
- b.. History demonstrated that kneejerk draconian reactions to perceived or actual terror threats are ineffective in preventing such terror events e.g. Europe in the latter nineteenth century.
